

SPECIAL SESSION PLANNED SOON TO TALK REBUILDING

error, secretary of state and treasurer will be held immediately upon the arrival of the executive from his cancelled tour of the southwestern portion of the state expected shortly after noon today.

The headquarters of the state liquor control commission, one of the first to go up in flames, will probably locate in Portland, where at the present time a branch is maintained. The chairman of the liquor control commission was with the governor in southern Oregon at the time of the fire.

Police Burned Out.
The state police, which maintained its offices on the third floor of the historic building which, while it gave a beautiful night light display to more than 20,000 spectators last night, destroyed its equipment and criminal records, other than finger prints, may locate for the time being with the city police.

The forestry department, along with the labor staff, was without quarters today, but efforts were being made to locate them in various unoccupied quarters over the city. The vocational education department will move over with the main department of education in the supreme court building. Neither the office building nor the temple of justice was affected by the fire other than the central heating supply was cut off for the present. It was located in the capitol.

One Killed, Three Injured.

One death and injury to three other men who volunteered services during the raging fire were the human toll taken by the greatest fire in the state's official history. Fireman Floyd McMillen, 18, also a student at Willamette university registered from Hermiston, lost his life when a cornice fell nearly a hundred feet to crush him beneath it. None of the other three were seriously hurt.

Firemen today were still playing water upon the smoldering ashes in order to cool the building so that an investigation of the main vault could be taken to ascertain the exact extent of damage. The fire, starting during the dinner hour last night, flamed brightly until the break of dawn.

Origin in Doubt.

Origin of the great blaze had not been ascertained today, but it was believed it started either from the kitchen, used part of each day, or of the supply room where waste paper was baled in the basement. The flames spread to the top of the copper dome through the hollow columns and the elevator shaft and the fire burned downward through the three main floors. The brick shell was left standing.

Among the relics destroyed in the blaze were the oil paintings of all former governors of the state and those of the founders of the Oregon territory, Jason Lee, Methodist missionary, and John McLaughlin, of the Hudson's Bay company. The masthead of the battleship Oregon was among the ruins.

Expect Special Session.

Oregon's capitol building was constructed under authority of the legislature of 1872 and the first unit completed in 1875. The copper dome, erected on the structure 16 years later, was 187 feet from the ground. It fell gracefully during the fire in a colorful blaze of yellow, green and blue. Shortly later it crashed through the remainder of the building.

Livestock Burns.

PENDLETON, Ore., April 26.—(AP)—Eleven horses and two calves burned to death last night when the barn of Herman Snyder, rancher on the Umatilla Indian reservation, was destroyed by fire.

WHEAT RESTRAINT IS LIFTED BY AAA

WASHINGTON, April 26.—(AP)—Comptroller General McCarl, after a period of study, has given the AAA the "go ahead" signal in its plan to let wheat farmers plant their full base acreage and yet draw benefits originally designed to reimburse them for reducing acreage. The AAA said this approval by McCarl of the "1935 supplementary wheat contracts" would release about \$20,000,000 to farmers and spell increased production of from 10,000,000 to 30,000,000 bushels, depending on the weather. The AAA plan was born of dry weather in the west, which made wheat production uncertain. Officials decided to take off the spring wheat restrictions this year and pay the farmers for the abandoned reduc-

CULINARY CRAFT....

The News in Pies. Here are some of the newest lines and clever cuts in pies—right up to the present strawberry season. Even the new names are those coined for the 1935 spring pie festival and should prove sufficiently intriguing to warrant a change from the good old stand-bys of other years.

Orange Blossom Pie. Pastry: 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup shortening, 5 tablespoons cold orange juice. Sift dry ingredients, add orange rind and cut in shortening coarsely, then add juice carefully. Roll out and place in pan, pricking on bottom and sides. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes.

Hula Moon Pie. Graham Cracker Crust: 20 graham crackers, 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup sugar. Crumble the crackers fine and mix with softened butter and sugar. Line pie pan with two-thirds of this mixture, reserving remainder for top crust. Filling: 2 cups crushed pineapple with juice, 1/2 cup sugar, 1-3 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Mix flour, sugar and salt and add pineapple and cook on low heat until mixture is thick and transparent, then add butter and lemon juice. When cold, turn into crumb lined pan and top with remainder of crust. Bake at 400 degrees 20 minutes.

Chocolate Filbert Pie. 2 1/2 cups milk, scalded, 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten, 4 tablespoons flour. 1 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup whipping cream, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar. Scald the chocolate with the milk and beat with a rotary beater until smooth. Add the flour, sugar and salt to the slightly beaten yolks. Pour a small amount of the chocolate mixture over the egg mixture, stirring and combining all until thickened. Add the butter and vanilla. Cool and add nuts which have been blanched and chopped. Pour into baked shell and chill thoroughly. Spread with sweetened whipped cream when ready to serve.

DECISION ON DOG TAX ENFORCEMENT AWAITS OFFICIAL CONFERENCE

Definite decision on what policy will be employed in enforcement of the dog tax law has not been made. District Attorney George A. Coddling said today. A plan of action is expected to be formulated by the first of the week. Conference between the dog control board composed of L. A. Salade, Jr. of Central Point, Theodore Fish, Jr. of Phoenix, and Dolph Phipps of Medford, Humane society aides, and county officials are scheduled. The state law provides that an unlicensed dog may be seized and killed or impounded. There has been talk that death might be dealt to unlicensed canines, but no final decree has been issued that such stringent steps would be taken. To date, 2805 dog licenses have been issued by the county clerk, which is estimated to include 75 per cent of the Jackson county dogs. Justice court juries in two cases for non-compliance with the dog tax laws have resulted in acquittals.
