

### FORM APPLIGATE GROUP TO BATTLE STOCK RUSTLERS

In an effort to stop extensive cattle-rustling on the range land of the Applegate district stockmen have organized to protect their property, and yesterday filed articles of incorporation of the Applegate Valley Protective Stock association with the county clerk. A reward of \$150 will be offered by the association, for the arrest and conviction of any person engaged in cattle thefts, according to Attorney Allison Moulton.

The association has a membership of 75, with Fred Lichens as president; Clarence Buck, vice-president; and Claus Kleinhammer as secretary-treasurer. Objectives of the association are set forth in the incorporation articles, as "protecting and promoting the livestock industry of the Applegate valley, creating a better acquaintance and closer association between stockmen, and protecting stock from the wrongful acts of any person whatsoever."

Applegate stockmen, the past year have sustained heavy losses from the activities of marauders according to Attorney Moulton. Cattle have been stolen and carried away in trucks and some butchered on the spot. There is evidence that thefts have been both by an organized gang, and by believing indigent wandering through the hills. The transient population of the district has increased the past two years, with the revival of gold mining.

The present high price of beef makes the loss of a cow from thieves, a substantial blow to the pocketbooks of stockmen, and an added lure to rustlers.

It is understood that other stock districts of the county plan to form similar associations, as self-protection, from cattle rustlers.

### WHILLOCK'S MARKS TWENTIETH YEAR

Whillock's Golden Rule, one of the oldest mercantile stores in the city, is celebrating its 20th anniversary this week. At that time a branch store was opened in Jacksonville, and this store has continued to thrive since. Catering to farm trade, and particularly those farmers living on the Applegate, the little store has shown remarkable progress.

"I have complete confidence in the future of Medford, as I have had for the past 20 years," Mr. Whillock stated today. Business he declares to be good, and he expressed the belief that the city is on the upswing as far as the mercantile business is concerned.
