## HOT TIME WAITS HEALY IF ROUGH STUFF IS TRIED

### Gentleman Casey Objects to Being Mussed Up—Wade-Hubka Match Also Takes Interest of Customers

Interest in the wrestling card that is to be staged tonight at the Armory is centered on the return of Gentleman Casey Columbo, happy-go-lucky Californian, who will exchange hugs and huffs in the headline bout with Jim Healy, big San Francisco who has surprised the fans recently by changing from a peace-loving grappler into a regular ring ruffian.

Healy, evidently deciding that clean, scientific wrestling is not spicy enough, has changed his technique to include slugging, kicking and the other characteristics of the meanie. The result has been that Healy is now much harder to cope with than before, although he was never a slouch at the wrestling game.

When he meets the gentleman mauler tonight the fans expect plenty of fireworks. Columbo, smooth, scientific wrestler that he is, hates to be mugged up and is liable to tear Healy apart if the going gets rough and bumpy. Casey, noted for his speed, is a popular matman with Medford wrestling addicts, who like his clever holds and his never-say-die spirit.

"Iron Man" Joe Hubka, ex-football star from University of Nebraska, will mix grips in the other half of the program with Glen Wade, big-time grappler from Winslow, Neb., who is probably the best man Hubka has been pitted against here, with the possible exception of Columbo.

Hubka will have a tough evening of it against the big Winslow wrestler, but is ready for the battle and promises a whirlwind performance as usual. When Joe is up against a man as good as himself, such as Wade, the outcome is usually a real exhibition of wrestling that never fails to bring cheers.

In action, Hubka is fast and loose, especially clever with his feet and his iron legs, with which he specializes. No matter what the size of his opponent, Hubka never fails to make it tough for him with his smooth footwork alone.

Third man in the ring will be Fireman Ray Frisbie.

## DERBY STARTERS REDUCED TO 16

Nellie Flag, a filly owned by Warren Wright's Calumet farm, is entitled to go with five pounds less. Jockey B. Workman is scheduled to ride Today.

Col. E. R. Bradley is relying on a single colt to bring home the honors in the sixty-first derby. This is Boston, which demonstrated yesterday that he will have to be reckoned with. Bothorn, flashed over the full derby distance in 2:06.4-5.

No other derby candidate has approached this time, so far as has been reported by clockers. Most trainers wound up their routine and will be content with light workouts for their charges between now and Saturday.
