United States. The vessel reaches New York today.

Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, member of a Philadelphia brewing family, did not report when his draft number was called in August, 1917. For more than two years he dodged arrest, but was captured by federal authorities January 7, 1920. On March 17 of that year he was sentenced to five years' imprisonment in Castle William, Governor's Island.

He received permission to visit his mother in Philadelphia and, while being taken there on May 21, escaped and fled to Germany, where he has lived since, a man without a country.

# LARGER EGGS UP CENT IN PORTLAND

Portland, Ore., May 2.—(AP)—Advance of 1 cent a dozen in the price of large or small special eggs on the produce exchange during the late session placed the market here on a slightly better basis but values were still below other leading cities.

There continued a good demand to move into coolers and this is taking care of current arrivals of quality.

Storage rejects were selling up to full prices for best available but others were being shaded slightly.

Trading in the butter market continued steady with prices unchanged on the exchange for the late session. Portland continued by far the lowest market along the coast.

Demands for live chickens was holding up well and generally around the recent high mark. All sorts of chickens were in liberal call with supplies short.

# Hop Code Drawn As Growers Wish

Salem, May 2.—(AP)—Fixing of minimum prices and allocation of saleable tonnage would be left entirely in the hands of the grower members of the hop industry, under the provisions of the marketing agreement tentatively approved by the secretary of agriculture at Washington, a copy of which was received here today.

The approval of the hop code by the national department of agriculture was looked upon as a complete triumph for the growers.

# Astoria Offers Oregon a Berth

Salem, May 2.—(AP)—Astoria today put in a bid for the location of the battleship Oregon, following reports of difficulty in securing a suitable spot for the historic warship at Portland.

Governor Martin received a letter from Dr. L. W. Hyde of Astoria who stated he was in "a position to give assurance the city of Astoria would harbor and care for the battleship Oregon." He added the city and port would provide a suitable place for the ship.

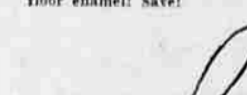
