## Pritchard to Pitch

The opening gun will find Courtney on the first sack. Sowers in left field. Woodyard at short. Hoffard in the center field. Calvert behind the bat. Welch in right field. Donovan on third. Arnie on second, and Pritchard, formerly with the San Francisco Seals, and now a local business man, doing the pitching.

For Klamath Falls, in left field will be Del Putnam. Pacific university star who batted .422 and who was placed in that position on the All Star team. Cecil Haley, All Star first baseman, will be on the initial sack.

Haley hit .377 last season and got consecutive blows in 13 games. On second base will be Paul "Bernie" Bernadoni, best keystone guard in the circuit last year and who plastered the pellet for a .255 average. Tommy Martin, .316 hitter, will take care of the center garden and Ken Kiger, .309, will cavort in right field.

On the pitching mound will be Clyde Carlstrom, the righthander with the big curve ball. Carlstrom was named along with Bill Nelson, Grants Pass, on the All Star pitching staff and won 5 and lost 6 last year. Five of Carlstrom's defeats were at the hands of Grants Pass, while Medford was able to defeat him but once. He won from Medford three times.

## One New For K. F.

Only behind the bat will Klamath Falls present a new face. With the loss of Bill Blanes, who is with Wilmington, Delaware in the Middle Atlantic league, the Red Sox have acquired the services of Roy Booth.

Booth caught for the Klamath All Stars last season and will be having his first season in faster ball. Paul Gehman, state league batter for Bend, will also be with the Red Sox and will be in readiness to relieve Carlstrom if needed.

Remainder of the Klamath Falls team will spread out with Earl Brooks, formerly with Blitz Winehart in the Portland city league, on third base. Roy Wheeler, .281 batting average last year, at shortstop and Joe Wilson, .370 last season, utility.

Other opening Southern Oregon league games will see John Milne's Ashland Lithians playing the champion Grants Pass team at Grants Pass May 12. Medford will open the league season at Ashland and Grants Pass will hop to Klamath Falls.

## GILMORES ACCEPT TILT WITH ROGUES

Manager Bud Conlin of the Jacksonville Gilmore Lions stated today that his team finds the date for the proposed Lion-Rogue baseball game on May 30, Decoration day, entirely to their liking, saying that he would just as soon hand the Rogues a beating on that as any other day.
