TRAFFIC SCHOOL INSTEAD OF JAIL AIDS VIOLATORS

Cities Enthusiastic Over Results Obtained With Autoists—Juveniles and Slight Offenders Get Instruction

WASHINGTON — (UP) — Cities which send their traffic law violators to school rather than jail have found the system a success, the American Automobile Association has reported.

The association based the finding on a survey conducted by its Safety and Traffic Engineering Department.

President Thomas P. Henry of the Association said the schools have proved meritorious in several types of cases, including juveniles, adult offenders who "would have been in different to a fine," and where a fine would have constituted a hardship.

Cities That Have Schools

Violators' schools are conducted in Berkeley, Los Angeles, Oakland, Piedmont, San Francisco and Tracy, Cal.; Wichita, Kan.; Detroit; Minneapolis; St. Louis; and Portland, Ore. Henry said plans were underway for establishment of similar institutions in other states.

"These schools are based on the generally accepted principle that education is an important factor in any comprehensive program for the reduction of highway fatalities and injuries," Henry said. "Magistrates constantly are faced with the fact that quite a large proportion of violators do not have a proper understanding of traffic regulations, of causes of accidents, or of the principles of safe driving."

Generally Juveniles

Generally, he said, violators turned over to the schools are juveniles or persons whose infractions have not been serious enough to warrant a severe penalty.

Subjects studied in the schools include: Cause and prevention of accidents; traffic regulations; enforcement; proper car care from a safety standpoint, and safe driving practices.

Examinations are held on the subjects and some schools require a good mark on test papers before releasing the violator. Most of the schools hold their sessions once or twice a week in the evening.

PWA APPLICATION ADVICE SENT OUT

PORTLAND, May 3—(AP)—Information giving all details on how to make applications for loans and loan-grants under terms of the huge public works relief bill now being administered, were sent last night by C. NEW MINE FIRE RAGES ALONG WITH OLD BLAZE

NEW STRATTSVILLE, Ohio—(UP)—A new mine fire is ravaging the New Strattsville area, beset for years by a continuously baffling underground blaze.

The old North Hocking Coal company vein has become a raging furnace since federal and state agents set fire to mash barrels found in the shaft. Flames from the burning mash barrels spread to the mine timbers, residents said.

WORLD IS HEADED STRAIGHT TO HELL SUNDAY BELIEVES

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla.—(UP)—Billy Sunday thinks the world is "headed straight to hell."

This American nation, of ours is seen as a second Rome whose grandeur slowly is crumbling by the 72-year-old veteran of the Sawdust Trail, whose voice has rung out in evangelistic halls for decades in a bitter battle against liquor and religious laxity.

Outlining his views, Sunday decried "atheistic leaders, dictatorial in power, fascist in politics, who are guiding the nation to its ultimate downfall."

"An age of American people indifferent to God, moral standards and the ideals of pioneering forefathers are aiding in the destruction of all that is American by their passive attitude," he added.

"The world is going straight to hell so fast it's breaking the speed limit," said the one-time baseball player, placing Russia and Germany in the van in this mad rush into disaster.

"The Russia which knew the absolute rule of czarism was a Sunday school comrade to the government by Stalin today," he asserted characteristically.

He thinks Germany is but little better, and other nations of the world are following close behind in the parade.

"In our own country everything's heading toward communism, socialism and fascism," he asserted.

"Even today our president, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, is a virtual dictator," Sunday said.

"And the American people are willing. Moreover, we would rather better our hold on this City of Destruction than flee from it."

This attitude of acceptance and tolerance of "damnable bad" conditions, the evangelist said, is fostered in schools and colleges by modern professors "who teach doctrines of free love, evolution, economic and social exaltation and, subtly, socialism to unsettled youth."

"We've got away from the little red schoolhouse we used to know, and that taught us that George Washington was a great man and a model for everything truly American," Sunday lamented. "Washington refused to be a king and he would have refused to be a dictator if there had been such a thing as a dictator back in those days."

"Youth must be freed of un-American influences, and the beliefs of today must be re-based on stable grounds of God and democracy before the nation will advance again."

"God won't let America advance any further until it catches up spiritually."

RICH SILVER MINE LEGEND RETURNS

ST. JOE, Ark.—(UP)—Legends of a rich silver mine supposed to be somewhere on the north bank of the Buffalo River near where it joins Tomahawk Creek, have been revived with the exhibition in Marshall recently of pieces of high-assaying silver ore and a few pieces of almost pure silver.

J. Tutley, who came here from Tulsa recently, owned the ore. He leased from C. B. Passmore, of Marshall, 300 acres of land, from which he said he had taken the metal.

The silver mine, called the Tabor

Mine, was supposed to have been operated by Indians long before white men reached this section.

Prospectors have worked the country east of here since the Civil War search for the mine.

Dr. W. F. Rogers, a merchant here and formerly a long-time prospector in this section, vouches for the story that a man named Tabor lived near the mouth of the Tomahawk until the closing months of the Civil War and appeared to have an inexhaustible supply of new silver.

SAFeway STORES BUY \$4,000,000 OREGON PRODUCTS

Safeway Stores purchased more than four million dollars worth of Oregon produced goods in 1934, according to recently tabulated figures compiled by this firm.

Appropriately enough, this announcement comes simultaneously with word from Safeway executives that all Safeway stores in Oregon are trying in 100 per cent with Oregon Products Week, May 3 to May 11, inclusive.

Safeway stores have always been a large purchaser of Oregon merchandise, much of which is shipped to other states in which the company operates.

The following is a breakdown of the 1934 figure mentioned above:

Total purchases of fruits and vegetables came to \$914,726.00; flour and flour products, \$912,624.00; dairy products, \$844,261.00; meats, fish and poultry, \$650,520.00; toilet paper, \$199,419.00; jams, jellies, honey, syrups, \$97,697.00; shortenings and cooking oils, \$93,331.00; candies, \$73,944.00; extracts and spices, \$36,793.00; household supplies, \$25,765.00; vinegar, \$21,825.00; soap, \$18,017.00; pickles, \$13,664.00; feed, \$13,209.00; beverages, \$10,383.00; malt syrup, \$9,688.00; nuts, \$26,367.00; miscellaneous, \$39,387.00.

According to Safeway officials, large as these figures are, it is expected that 1935 purchases will exceed them due partly to the company's large expansion program and partly to the expected increase of consumer support of this year's Oregon Products Week.

COTTAGE GROVE LADY, 80, WOULD GO FISHING

EUGENE, Ore.—(UP)—Mrs. Nancy Burge, of Cottage Grove, may be 80 years old but she's going fishing this spring.

PROFESSOR DEBUNKS VOODOOISM IN HAITI

CHICAGO—(UP)—Stories of seamen and fiction writers of bloody voodoo rites in the West Indies have been "debunked" by Dr. Melville J. Herskovits, who recently returned from a three-month sojourn in native huts of the most primitive peoples in Haiti and western Africa.

Dr. Herskovits, professor of anthropology at Northwestern Univer-

sity, has engaged for 10 years in research among black races.

"Voodooism is not the bloody terror that movies and books make of it," he said. "In reality it is a most peaceful religion. Its devotees attend ceremonies regularly on Saturday night, much in the nature of Wednesday prayer meeting. Human sacrifice is unknown."

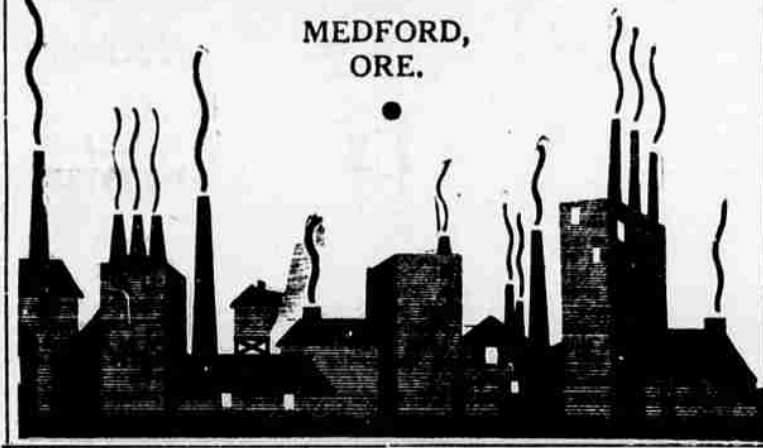
