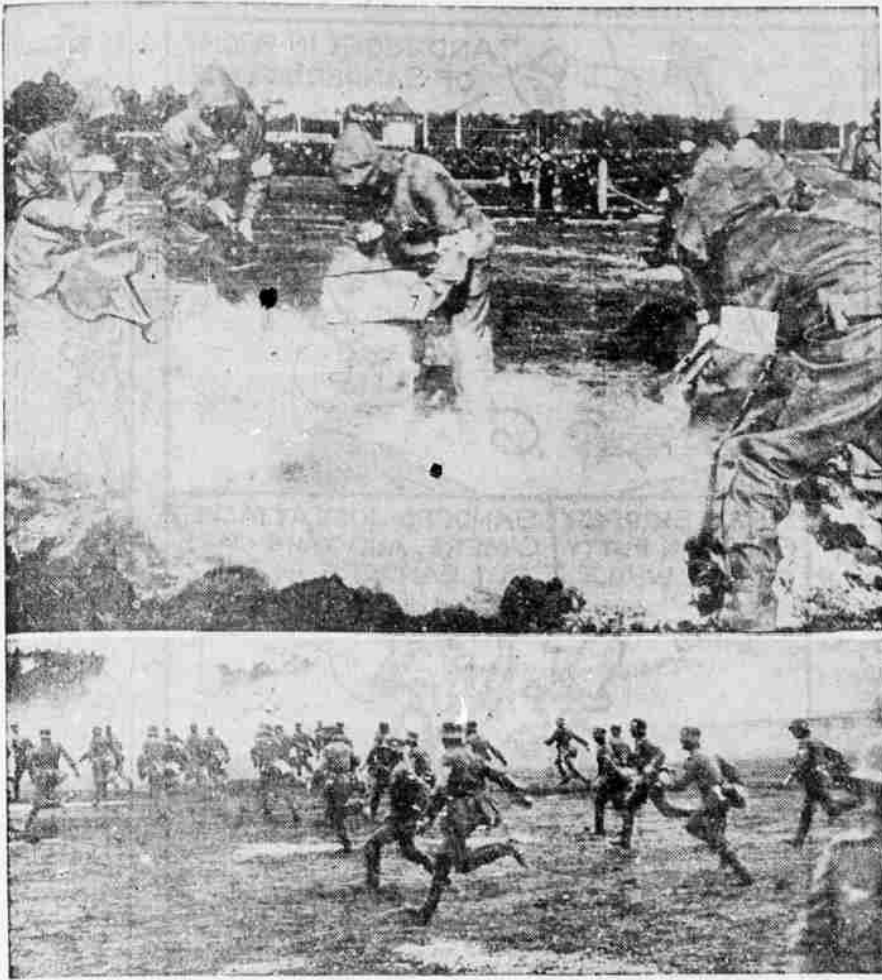


GERMAN SOLDIERS DRILL AS TREATY REPUDIATED



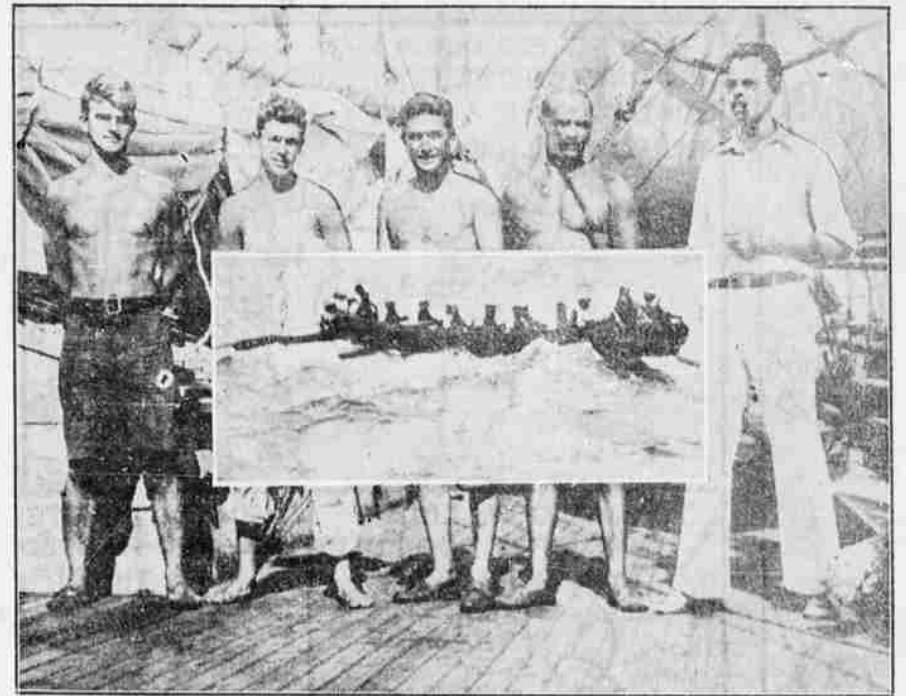

THE 'MET' GOES BURLESQUE

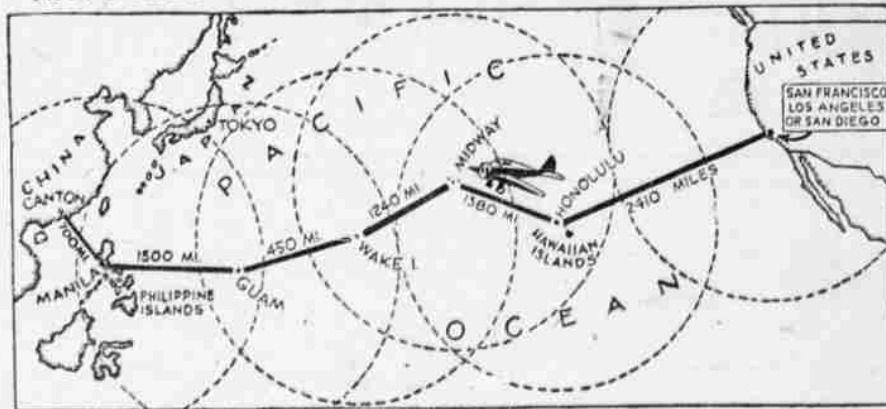
