

PERL DESCRIBES TRIP TO PANAMA AT ROTARY MEET

An interesting description of his recent visit to the Panama Canal Zone was given by John Perl at today's Rotary meeting at Hotel Medford. Because of the moderate cost and great enjoyment of this trip every American should see America's great engineering feat—the Panama canal, the speaker said. An interesting description of the various points of interest at the canal and the remains of old dredges and other equipment used by French engineers in their futile attempt to complete the original project were given by Mr. Perl. Military precautions taken by the United States army and navy to safeguard America's great investment were also mentioned. The canal at the points of the locks is 110 feet wide and 80 feet deep.

An interesting account of Mr. Perl's visit to the cities in the canal zone, and his description of the natives and their customs and characteristics, were also given. Mr. Morgan, his trails and cannon, may still be viewed by tourists.

Mr. Perl concluded his interesting talk with a description of the massive and intricate equipment of electric "mules" used in handling boats through the canal.

TICK FEVER WARNING SENT RELIEF HEADS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 7.—(AP)—All work relief project managers and superintendents in Oregon have been warned to guard against any appearance of Rocky Mountain spotted fever, sometimes known as tick-fever, following reports of two deaths in Harney county as a result of the dreaded disease.

The fever is caused by the bite of the female tick, usually during the spring and early summer, and often proves fatal to the person infected.

NEWPORT, Ore., May 7.—(AP)—With the recovery from the Alsea river of the body of Lawrence Oberer of Portland, one of four persons drowned March 23 when their automobile slid into the stream, the bodies of all the crash victims have been accounted for.

Foy Lamb, professional football player; J. Russell Atchison, and Delbert Scott, Skappoose high school.

Fred J. Marinou, now coaching at Nampa, Idaho, high school has applied, as has E. V. Cain, graduate of the University of Washington and Washington State college. Lawrence Hosteller, coach at Arlington, Oregon high school is a graduate of the University of Southern California who has applied, and Donald Robinson, coach at Fallon, Nevada, a graduate of Eureka college in Illinois is another prospect. L. W. Tucker, coach at Clatskanie, an applicant, is a graduate of Pacific university.

Kenneth R. Zinn is the applicant from Miami university in Ohio. Of these applicants some will undoubtedly be seriously considered before the final selection is made.

Thomas Ireland, of Myrtle Creek, a graduate of O. S. C., is being urged by his friends to apply, as are Don Faber of Astoria, a Willamette graduate, and Carl Bourrell, O. S. C., who is now athletic director at Central Point.

An application of interest is that of "Dusty" Kline, who has an impressive record in both football and basketball. Kline is at the present time coach at Boise, Idaho, the school which recently appointed D. K. Burger, Medford coach, to the position of head athletic director.

One man prominently mentioned for the position is Medford's own Bernie Hughes. Hughes has one of the most impressive records in the state, as a player, but has not made application. There is a possibility that he can not meet the technical qualifications for a teachers certificate in this state, but if he can meet the requirement there is little doubt but what he would rank high among the field.

Another Medford man who would probably be looked upon with favor were he to apply is Bill Bowersman, high school star here while under Callison, University of Oregon star, and now coach of Franklin high school in Portland.

"Richest" John Warren, Astoria coach who has had his application in at Medford for some time, is definitely out of the picture, according to Hedrick, he having cancelled his application by wire upon acceptance of the freshman coaching position at the University of Oregon some time ago.

city, he returned to the hotel, where he bought three copies each of the Portland Journal and the Portland Oregonian. He informed the cigar stand attendant that the managing editors of both these metropolitan sheets "fell down on the job, and left out the big chain-letter story."

"World's greatest scoop!" A Mail Tribune scribe, while eating his breakfast, was contacted by "Parrell" with the promise, "I have the greatest scoop in history for you." In a lobby corner the scribe was directed to do the following:

Telegraph the city editor of the San Francisco Examiner, "to get out an extra on the chain letter story." "Run out to the airport and reserve a seat on the next plane, and buy a ticket."

Order out the state police at once, to act as an escort.

People Dime Crazy "There is this much about it," said Mr. "Parrell", "unless everybody starts tearing up chain-letters as fast as they get them, the monetary system of America is a goner. The people will have gone crazy over a dime. I will have it stopped by three o'clock this afternoon. If I fall kiss America good bye."

The crusader rushed about in his shirt-sleeves, took copious notes, and ran up and downstairs frequently, in the heat of his battle. He is a man of about 35 years, plainly dressed, of medium stature, and provided with funds.

Early this morning, a number of local residents received telephone calls from "Parrell" announcing his plan to abolish chain-letters.
