



MIDGET FIGHTERS WILL BE FEATURE ON ELK CCC CARD

Two half-pint scrappers who have had to fight out of their class because of a lack of smaller opponents, will be pitted against each other in the opening event of the Elk-CCC fight card at the Elks temple Thursday evening.

They are Pee Wee Shelton, 115 pounder of Camp McKinley, and Walter (Vest-Pocket) Scoble, 116 of Oregon Caves. Both of these boys have been fighting heavier opponents because so few worthy 115-pounders are available, so Capt. William C. Ryan, district athletic officer, is giving them a chance to battle for the 115-pound crown.

Their bout will open the fireworks on Thursday evening's classic card. Although a tentative lineup has been announced, the complete list of bouts will be decided Thursday afternoon. Thirty of the leading scrappers of the district, including a number of new boys from San Francisco and Los Angeles clubs who came in with the last enrollment, will be brought here. Following their examination and weighing-in by the district surgeon, the definite list of events will be announced.

Several of the bouts are definitely slated, however. De Shields, flashy colored fighter of Oak Knoll, and Chief Thomas, great Indian brawler from Bradford, will be seen in the main event. This match has been in the making for three months and promises to be one of the season's best. Curly Levan, Casberry's team man, will meet Rudy Lear, of South Park, in another featured bout.

The Elks committee in charge of the affair includes Jerry Jerome, chairman; J. V. Watson, Al Stoehr, Wilete Pruitt and Bert Crum.

NO HIT GAME IS HURLED BY HESS

With Hess pitching no-hit, no-run baseball, Joe Nee's Jacksonville high school nine yesterday afternoon at Ashland blanked Don Faber's Ashland high school team 3-0. Early in the struggle the game evolved into a pitcher's battle, with Hardy of Ashland giving but little to Hess. Both men are exceptional for high school material, and both pitch semi-pro ball in the Southern Oregon league while not at their text books.

The infield from Jacksonville gave Hess better support than did Hardy's, but that cannot detract from the performance of either man. Hess struck out 14 while Hardy was whiffing 16 in the seven inning game. Ashland failed to get a hit, one batter was struck by a pitched ball, and there were two bingles, to compare with eight men placed on first by Jacksonville to only four Ashland players making the initial sack. Jacksonville got three hits, two walks and three bingles.

In the fourth frame, Hess whiffed the first three batters to face him while Hardy banded the same uncomfortable experience to the history city lads in the first, fifth and seventh innings.

M'LEAN SIGNED AS ROGUE PITCHER

GATES REPLACED AT SAVAGE DAM

Gates on sections 7 and 8 at Savage Rapids dam, which fell Sunday evening when a stay chain broke, and which lowered the level of water stored behind the dam by perhaps a foot, have been replaced, and water

again turned into the irrigation canal. No damage was done by the break other than the ruining of the chain, the flow of fish going up the new ladder not having been interrupted, the state police here stated today. The rush of water through the spillway when the gates went out naturally muddied the river somewhat, and the resultant high water below the dam halted fishing activities temporarily, but no lasting inconvenience was experienced. Accidents of this kind are generally expected when irrigation operations are begun each year. It was learned.

Hi Sherman, another Salt Lake City middleweight, won on a foul from Barnacle Bill Watkins, rough Texas grappler, who made the mistake of trying to manhandle Referee Pat Reagan, who got the best of the tiff and awarded the deciding fall to Sherman.

SARAZEN PICKS REVOLTA TO WIN

PITTSBURGH, May 7. (AP)—Doughty Gene Sarazen, who modestly calls himself "a 100-to-one shot," after looking the situation over, will see Johnny Revolta of Michigan as the probable winner of the National golf open next month.

Gene went a round on the Oakmont course where the tourney will be held and opined that things will be much, much harder than in 1927 when Tommy Armour took the title here.

"It's going to be the hardest 72 holes the boys have had to play in many years," remarked the master who has twice held the open title, in 1922 and 1932. The Oakmont course now is more tricky than ever in Gene's opinion.

He figures that a score of 296 will be enough to take the title but "you can bet 296 won't be broken."

As for Revolta, Gene points to his winter record in which he had an average of 71.23 for 46 rounds in competition. He was second only to Henry Picard, the big money getter from Hazebach, Pa.
