



ARMORY GRAPPLE TONIGHT WILL PIT COLORFUL STARS

'Baron' Ginsberg and Bickerton Expected to Put On Wild Scramble—Pete Belcastro Challenges Winner

Two new, highly-touted ring ruffians—Boony ("Boss") Ginsberg of New York and Ernie Bickerton of Canada—will hold forth at the armory tonight in the main event of Promoter Lillard's two-ply program of muscle manning.

The biggest attractions for some time, Ginsberg and Bickerton, both among the top-notch grapplers of the northwest, will probably stage the wildest scramble seen at the local grunt and grime headquarters in months.

They will have an incentive to pound each other into submission, as Lillard announced today that Pete Belcastro, original wild Italian and the biggest drawing card ever to tread the Medford arena, has issued a challenge to the winner and will meet him here next week. Belcastro, who has been in the cut for several months, is now in Oklahoma City and plans to fly back in time for an appearance here a week from tonight—good news for scores of local fans.

The odds between Ginsberg and Bickerton stack up about even, promising a close, fast bout full of color. Both are rough and tumble wrestlers but know the game scientifically as well, being rated among the outstanding bone benders of the continent.

The "Baron," an Austrian Jew, won his nickname from his little gaucy, colorful and a good scrapper, this man should satisfy the most particular fan.

Big Casey Colombo of Hollywood will return for an appearance in the other half of the program, having been rematched against pugilistic Jim Healy of San Francisco. The former Hollywood weight lifter, smooth and fast, is popular with the fans.

Last week he defeated the San Franciscan two out of three falls, and figures what he did once he can do again, although Healy, who recently turned badman, will probably wipe the program with more dirty work this time than before.

The promoter reports that tickets are selling better than tatted, and a good attendance is expected. Third man in the ring will be Fireman Ray Frisbie.

Curly Logan, 164, Corberry, and Rudy Lear, 164, South Fork, are slated to tussle in a slugging contest. Walter Seattle, 116, Oregon Cove, and Pee Wee Shelton, 119, Medford, will open the show.
