CULINARY CRAFT

Pictureque speech has landed in the kitchen. News items therefrom are mentioned "Miracle Cookery."

"Cellophane Demonstrations" and such like. There's no use looking in the cook book or the dictionary, the answer is in this.

It wasn't long ago that "Dated Coffee" means to look for little numbers on the coffee tin, only to find that the date was on the outside of the tin.

So, I find that the cellophane is on the outside of the electric range. In fact, the oven, the "Thrift Cooker" and the various surface cooking elements may each have a meal in the process of cooking and the whole is covered with this huge cellophane slip cover. We might suppose the range was covered up for the summer, safe from dust and wear.

Imagine the surprise and delight in store for us when the transparent cover is removed and perfectly cooked food appears as if by "miracle!" Well, that's how it is, and that's what they mean by the new word.

Another one of these marvels is butter cake baked from a cold oven—with a result of finer grain, greater volume and, of course, least amount of current consumed in the baking.

When we tell you that pies, cream puffs and such pastries are also started in a cold oven it probably seems just too much. However, please remember that miracles must be wonders and that they must be taken in "faith." These, however, can be proved easily by trial so try them soon and at least be "in the know" about these new methods.

Cream Puffs First of all let me give you the recipe for making and for baking the cream puffs, and then I'll tell you the "why" of their fairy baking.

1 cup water
1/2 cup butter
1 cup bread flour
4 eggs

Combine the water and butter in a sauce pan. Bring to the boiling point on the surface unit of an electric range with switch turned to high heat. Add flour, all at once. Cook, stirring constantly, until the mixture thickens and forms a ball. Remove from the unit and cool slightly. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating

the mixture thoroughly between the addition of each egg.

Drop the mixture by spoonfuls on a greased baking sheet. Then place the cream puffs in a cold electric oven. Set temperature control of the electric oven at 400 degrees, turn the switch to bake and bake the cream puffs until done, approximately forty-five minutes.

Bread Toss Cake
1/2 cup butter
4 eggs
2-3 cups flour
4 squares chocolate
2 cups sugar
1 cup milk
5 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Cream the butter and add gradually half the sugar. Beat yolks of eggs until thick and lemon-colored and gradually add the remaining sugar. Combine the mixtures. Sift, measure and sift flour again with baking powder and salt. Add alternately with milk, then add whites of eggs beaten stiff, chocolate melted and vanilla.

Pour the mixture into an oiled loaf pan. Bake in a cold electric oven at 350 degrees. Turn the switch to bake and bake for 45 minutes.

Baked Apples
Apples can be baked successfully in the temperature and moisture controlled electric oven without the necessity of being placed in a pan of hot water.

4 apples
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 cup water
Wash and core apples. Pour sugar in cavity. Add 1/2 cup water. Place in shallow baking pan. Turn the oven switch to bake. Set temperature control to 375 degrees. Bake 45 minutes, depending on size of apples.

Nut Fruit Bread (The Miracle Way)
2 cups bread flour
1/2 teaspoon oil
1/2 cup broken nut
1/2 cup chopped dates
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup candied cherries (cut)
1 egg slightly beaten
1 cup milk
2 tablespoons melted shortening

Mix and sift all dry ingredients. Add nuts and fruits. Beat egg and add milk and melted shortening. Pour liquid ingredients into dry ingredients slowly. Beat well.

Place bread in cold oven. Set temperature control to 350 degrees. Turn switch to bake. Bake one hour, approximately.

48 AIRPLANES HOP OFF AT HONOLULU FOR MIDWAY ISLES

gain entrance. Nobody was permitted inside with a camera.

Only a few outsiders, and these gathered on a hillside nearby, saw the beginning of the flight.

Honoluluans generally paid little attention to the mass flight, being aware they would not be admitted to the navy yard, and also being accustomed to airplane operations.

Due Tonight
The planes, it was learned, are expected to reach Midway Island by 7 o'clock tonight (9:30 p. m. P. S. T.).

This would mean about a 10-hour flight, since considerable time was required for the start. Allowing three minutes between each takeoff, it would require approximately two and one-half hours for all planes to get into the air.

The flight was not expected to pass over Honolulu, but head northward from Pearl Harbor, which would carry it along the opposite side of Aahu Island, on which Honolulu is situated.

Apparently the flight will be strung out as a half hour after the 10:10 squadron had not taken off.

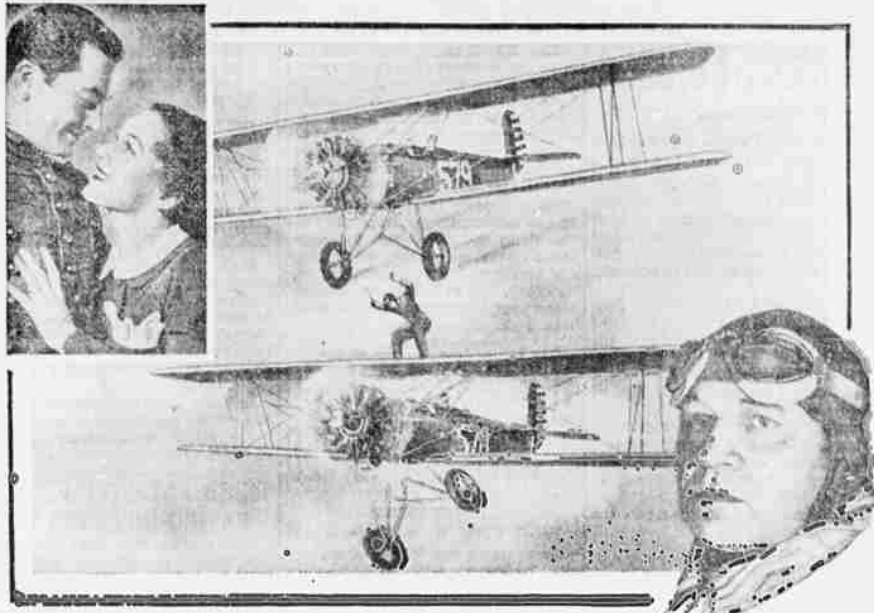

KLAMATH WOMAN SOBS AS MURDER STORY IS TOLD BY POLICEMAN

MISS MARYE LISTER, who was charged with the murder of her husband, was sobbing as she sat between her brother and her defense counsel, Miss Mervin, charged with first degree murder, today heard Klamath Falls police officers relate the events of last February 1 when Lawrence Lister, meat dealer, was found shot to death in a rooming house.

Miss Mervin walked into the police station a few moments after she said she had killed Lister for "letting her down."

Over the objections of Defense Attorney David Vandenberg, Judge Ashurst permitted officers to quote Miss Mervin's statements at the station. Vandenberg had insisted that the woman had not been apprised of her constitutional rights nor informed that anything she might say would be used against her.

The judge ruled that Miss Mervin went voluntarily to headquarters and that her words were not in the nature of a confession.

With Everett Powers and Louis Arnold, policemen, said the woman admitted "just killing a man."

It is the defense contention that Lister had betrayed her and that she shot him in self defense.

PHONE REVENUES GROW ON COAST

PACIFIC Telephone and Telegraph company reports a gain for its revenues and those of associated companies in the first quarter of this year over last of about 4 per cent. Revenues were \$22,942,955 in the 1935 quarter, compared with \$22,004,288 in the first 3 months of last year.

Included in the revenues was \$99,700 collected in Oregon, which may have to be refunded to customers in that state in the event of an adverse court decision involving rates. The net income after dividends was a deficit of \$20,156, compared with the 1934 quarter deficit of \$234,803.

RECORD TOURIST FLOW FOR SOUTHERN OREGON PREDICTED THIS YEAR

Jack Davis of Redding, Cal., field secretary for the Shasta Cascade Wonderland association, in a visit to Medford today expressed the opinion that the biggest tourist business since 1928 can be expected this year in southern Oregon and northern California, basing the observation on the opinions of officials throughout the Wonderland, who are in a position to know.

Mr. Davis, who will remain in Medford the rest of the week, is visiting Jackson county on a membership tour in which a membership drive in southern Oregon is being launched.

Largely through increased advertising on the parts of the railway companies and the stage lines, Mr. Davis said, more inquiries on summer vacation opportunities have been received from the public on the west coast so far this season than are normally received up until mid-summer.

With an increase in Oregon's membership in the association of from 500 to 900 per cent, Mr. Davis says the outlook is bright and that with all the advertising in California and in the east that has been carried on, an influx of tourists can be expected.
