 Southern Oregon League baseball will be inaugurated at Ashland and Klamath Falls next Sunday, when Jake Ope's Grants Pass Merchants open the Klamath Falls season against the Red Sox at Modoc park and Paul Hoffman's Medford Rogues journey to Ashland to tangle with John Miljus' Lithians at the high school field.

The battle at Klamath Falls, with the undisputed league lead at stake, will see Frankie Eastart, brilliant Grants Pass southpaw hooking up with Clyde Carlstrom, Klamath Falls right-hander.
Sunday Games Allowed
 At Ashland, for the first time in many, many years, Sunday baseball will be played at the high school field. After years of trying to obtain permission from the school board the use of the field for Sunday baseball, a business men's committee was finally successful in the quest, and from now on, the Ashland Lithians will play all their home games in the fenced athletic field, directly below the high school building. A covered grandstand will provide seating for 1200 spectators, while the playing field itself, will be one of the finest in the circuit.

Fireworks Expected
 Although both teams lost their opening battles last Sunday, the game is expected to provide more than the usual amount of fireworks always exploding in all Ashland-Medford games. GRAPPLING BARON EASY WINNER OVER ERNIE BICKERTON

Benny "Baron" Ginsberg, big Austrian Jew from New York City, had little trouble in winning two out of three falls from Ernie Bickerton of Canada in the main event at the Armory last night, despite the fact that the Canadian nearly throttled him with a towel.

The bout was slow and uneventful, spiced only with a little eye gouging on the part of the Baron, whose stubby chinwhiskers got pulled until he was blue in the face as a consequence.
 The first fall went to the Canadian, when he applied a Boston Crab hold that caused the Baron to pat the mat before he was even flattened. Bickerton tried the same thing the next time, but the Baron got rough and in five minutes took the second tumble with a body press.
 The Canadian's attack with the towel came in the last session, when he came out of his corner with it behind his back and used it for a choke hold. The Baron, however, was not even phased, and took the deciding tumble with a press in four minutes. Ginsberg weighed 220 and Bickerton 218 pounds.

Jim Healy, burly San Franciscan, made good his vow to even the score with Casey Columbus, limber grappler from Hollywood, and in the first half of the program the pugnaucious Bay City man won two out of three falls by using hammerlocks.
 After beating Healy's head on the mat with a head scissors, Casey used a vicious body slam to win the first fall in eight minutes. Healy turned badman in a big way after that, and went after the ex-weight lifter with his fists, using choke holds when he got close enough to apply them. Casey refused to take the fall on fouls, and Healy used a hammer lock so roughly that Referee Ray Friebe gave him the fall in ten minutes to save Columbus's arm. The arm was useless in the third round, and Columbus went down in two minutes on another hammerlock. Both weighed 218.

Vincent Richards Hurt In Smashup

about persons who play with firearms. Baer was hurt while rehearsing a radio skit in a local studio yesterday. Jerry Casale, attached to his camp, was watching. There was talk of sound effects.
 Casale decided the sound of the revolver shot, heard over the air, was not loud enough. He loaded a revolver with blank cartridge, accidentally pulled the trigger and the gun went off, injuring Baer superficially. "But they can't keep a good man down," the champion said when it was all over, and he had received an injection of tetanus anti-toxin.

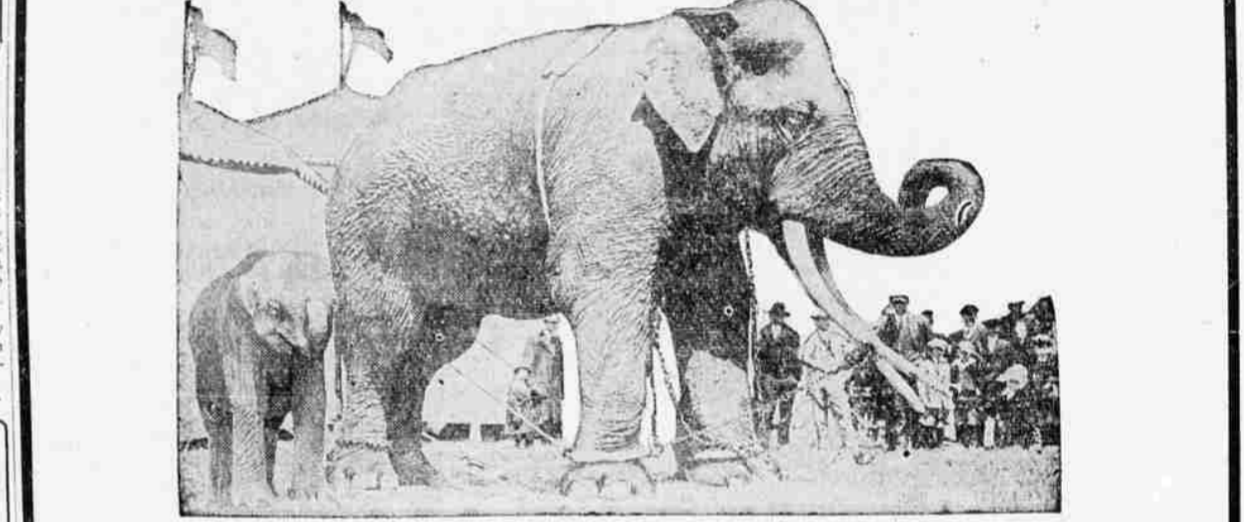
