OREGON SPRINTER SETS NEW MARKS BUT TEAM LOSES

Shoemaker Equals North-West Record For Century Dash In Washington Meet

WASHINGTON STADIUM, SEATTLE, May 11.—(AP)—In spite of the brilliant record of Carson Shoemaker, Oregon sprinter, in the sprint events, the University of Washington Huskies routed off with victory in their dual track meet with the Webfoots today 7 1/2 to 5 1/2.

The big Oregon center runner was the sensation of the day, dashing off the century in 9.6 seconds and then blazing over the 200-yard distance in 23.8 seconds to shatter Washington stadium dual marks.

Shoemaker's 9.6 equaled the best time ever made in the northwest, a mark hung up 19 years ago by Morrison of Idaho. It also broke the 9.7 Washington record made by Russell Sweet of Montana in 1926.

In the 220 the Webfoots clipped four-tenths of a second off the local mark of 31 seconds established by Frank Plumb of Washington two years ago.

In both events Bruce Humber, husky ace, forced Shoemaker to the tape and was only nose out by inches each time.

Washington won seven of the 15 events, the most surprising of which was the victory of John Buckley in the 400-yard dash, which had been figured as a clinch for the Webfoots. Buckley heaved the ball 44 feet 5 1/2 inches while Gardner Frye was able to locate only 44 feet.

The only clean sweep came in the 200-yard mid hurdle in which Lipscombe, Prusan and Ansbuth finished in that order for the Huskies.

The Oregon Howard Patterson won the 400 in 49.7; Marvin Franke the pole vault with 13 feet; Jay the discus with 141 feet 3 1/2 inches; Arne Lindgren the broad jump with 22 feet 3 1/2 inches; Warren Demaris the javelin with 209 feet 6 inches, and Shoemaker the two sprints.

In taking the javelin, Demaris beat his teammate Robert Parke, national collegiate champion, thrower last year. Parke made only 194 feet 8 inches.

The track was dry and fast and a bright wind aided the sprinters, but officials said it was not strong enough to prevent recognition of Shoemaker's records.

LITHIANS, ROGUES TO TANGLE TODAY

The grades fight between the Ashland Lithians and the Medford Rogues will be worth watching when the two tangle this afternoon in Ashland, with both sides clamoring for the other's blood.

Hard feelings were aroused last week upon the announcement that "Chief" McLean, flashy Ashland pitcher, wanted to play with the Medford nine. Ashland enthusiasts countered this and out of it and admitted for a suspension of every player who transfers during the season. The Medford squad maintains that since there were no contracts, they could hardly be cancelled, and that to attempt to bar a player who moves from one club to another is ridiculous.

According to Manager "Hooper" Hofford, McLean has stated that he will hunt for the Rogues and Hofford sees no reason to doubt this is true, and has announced McLean in his starting lineup. Ashland has done the same thing only their announcements have McLean behind the plate. The solution would be interesting.

While Medford is settling difficulties at Ashland, Grants Pass will be getting with their computer to Klamath Falls. Large crowds are anticipated in both cities, with opening time set for 2:30.

OMAHA CAPTURES PREAKNESS PURSE IN EASY FASHION

BALTIMORE, May 11.—(AP)—Once again asserting his right to rank with the turf's great, Omaha, William Woodward's chestnut son of Gallant Fox, capped his easy Kentucky derby victory with an even more decisive triumph today as his flying hoofs left seven other three-year-olds far in the rear in the 46th running of the Preakness at Pimlico.

Guided by Willie (Smoky) Saunders, the slim-barreled speedster stepped through the stretch as if out for a morning breeze to finish the one and three-sixteenth mile six lengths clear of Walter M. Jefford's Finsthorn, which was eating Omaha's dust for the first time this year. Still another six lengths to the rear trailed Mrs. Dodge Stoen's Payne's Bid, seeking to duplicate the 1934 feat of his stable mate, High Quest.

Omaha was clocked in 1:58 2-5, one fifth of a second slower than the race record hung up by High Quest but the time might have been shattered had Saunders so desired. Even at that it was more than two seconds faster than Gallant Fox made in taking the Preakness five years ago.

Made the odds-on choice by the record crowd of 40,000, including many congressmen and other high in the political and social life of the nation and state, Omaha never left the outcome in doubt once he swung into stride. He paid \$3.90 for a \$2 win but while his owner, New York banker and chairman of the stewards of the Jockey Club, received \$25,225, the victory boosted Omaha's total for the year to \$66,000 and for two years of racing to \$70,450.

CANZONERI WHIPS AMBERS HANDILY TO REGAIN TITLE

NEW YORK, May 11.—It's an old ring axiom that they never come back but black-haired Tony Canzoneri, the dapper little fellow who looks like a miniature Babe Ruth and packs "TNT" in his right hand, today is the exception to prove the rule.

For all practical purposes, Canzoneri's decisive victory over Lou Ambers last night in 15 rounds at Madison Square Garden returns him to the status of lightweight champion of the world, successor to Chicago's Barney Ross, who recently relinquished the title, and the first fighter in the history of the class to regain the crown. Tony lost the championship to Ross in 1933 after holding it for nearly three years.

In recapturing a title that has been held by some of the finest craftsmen in fighting annals, Canzoneri thrilled a crowd of 17,433 cash customers, nearly packing the Garden, with as fine an exhibition of boxing skill as New York has witnessed since the eminent Benny Leonard turned back the challenge of Lefty Lew Tendler at the Yankee stadium a dozen years ago.

Canzoneri floored the rugged, stout-hearted Ambers twice in the third round with vicious right-handers and again blew the "Herkimer Hurricane" down in the 15th round with a long belt to the chin as Lew was hustling to get out of the way. From start to finish, despite the rugged upstate boy's most courageous and aggressive efforts to turn the tide, Canzoneri had the situation under almost complete control. The unanimous decision of Referee Arthur Donovan and the two judges was a formality at the finish.
