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### Comment on the Day's News

AMELIA EARHART hops off in Mexico City, and heads for New York. As these words are written, she has covered in about nine hours some 1300 miles of her proposed 2100-mile non-stop flight.

THE interesting part of this flight is that it is undertaken without halloo, just a casual stunt, undertaken, apparently, without much preparation.

Non-stop flights from Mexico City to New York must still be regarded as "stunts," but there is every reason to expect that in the not too distant future they will be everyday affairs, attracting little or no attention.

Even now they attract no more attention than a 100-mile automobile trip attracted 35 years ago.

IF YOU are still reasonably young, the time will come when you may own an airplane and hop off as casually for Mexico City, or Miami, or Alaska, or perhaps even Honolulu, as you now get in your car and start for San Francisco.

(This, of course, only in the event that you are willing to work hard to get the money with which to buy an airplane and the gasoline to run it and to pay your hotel bills when you get there.)

WE ARE too apt in these days of so-called over-production and scarcity of jobs to think of all the great days as past and of all the worthwhile developments as having been made.

That isn't true. If people don't get OUT OF THE HABIT of work, in these dole years of waiting for prosperity to get up confidence enough to come around the corner, there will be far greater developments in the future than we have ever seen in the past.

THIS headline is reminiscent: "Oregon Railroad to Coast Millions." The railroad referred to is projected from Port Orford to Leland, and is a PAPER railroad.

THE government, we read, is expected to take over administration of relief from the states about July 1. Thereafter state relief agencies will be responsible to Washington instead of to the governors of the states.

One reason given for this is the controversies that have recently arisen with several of the states. Another is that centralization of relief forces will provide a more responsive organization.

Another reason, not mentioned but MUCH MORE IMPORTANT, is that next year is a campaign year.

TURKEYS CHEAPER THAN CHICKS NOW  
PORTLAND, Ore., May 11.—(AP)—The late cut by the price on turkeys here which carried the dressed hen price down to 10c, generally to retailers, suggested lack of quality.

There was good demand for quality turkeys but practically nothing has been available recently that would come into that grade. Most of the stock received has been breeders and this showed poor to fair grade.

There continued a lack of price change for butter on the produce exchange, even though there remained a premium generally for quality on the open market. Storage operations were general.

### COURT DECISION WEDNESDAY UPON RAZING OLD WALL

BALEM, Ore., May 11.—(AP)—The temporary restraining order against the razing of the walls of the old capitol building was continued today by Judge L. G. Lewelling of the Marion county circuit court until Wednesday, at which time he expected to hand down his decision on its dismissal or permanency.

With the statement, "I believe you gentlemen (speaking to the opposing counsel) misunderstood each other," Judge Lewelling announced he would study the additional citations added to the briefs during oral argument today and prepare his decision by Wednesday of next week.

The Marion County Taxpayers' league, represented by President Henry Zorn, Ed Jory, Willard Stevens, and Martin Hostford, during the week had obtained a temporary restraining order against destruction of the walls of the burned building, contending it was the duty of the state legislature and not the board of control to proceed with the razing.

Four were injured about 10:30 Friday night when two cars, traveling in opposite directions, slipped on the Pacific highway one mile north of Central Point. The injured, who were removed to Medford hospitals, were Mrs. E. L. Childers, Mrs. Ruth Robinson both of Medford, and Mrs. J. L. Larson of Portland, passengers in a car Mrs. Childers was driving and Mrs. John R. White of Grants Pass, passenger in a car her husband, Capt. John R. White, was driving.

The White auto was also occupied by their three children, who were uninjured. Mrs. Childers suffered serious face cuts and a broken nose, Mrs. Robinson suffered a broken jaw and face cuts, and Mrs. Larson suffered a scalp wound. They were taken to the Sacred Heart hospital. Mrs. White, taken to the Community hospital, was able to leave Saturday morning after being treated for lesser cuts and bruises.

The car driven by Mrs. Childers, a DeSoto Airflow, was traveling south. The auto, both damaged by the impact, were thrown into ditches on opposite sides of the highway.
