Upon their arrival today, Mr. Reames stated that the trip was the greatest rest he had ever had, and that he was now ready to take up his law work with increased vigor.

BAIRD TO SPEAK ON SEAL OF GOD

Rev. W. R. Baird will speak on the "Seal of God" at the Christian church Sunday night. Many are interested in this subject because of the important place the Bible has given it in regard to the last great war and the coming of Christ.

The following questions will be answered by Bible quotations: Can we be saved without the Seal of God? Why does Satan want false seal theories taught? What is the Seal of God? How do we receive God's stamp of ownership? Does the seal contain the name of office and territory belonging to God? Catholics believe the highest authority is the voice of the church; Protestants believe the Bible is the highest tribunal to which a Christian can go. In this respect are you Roman Catholic or Protestant? Can a child lead you or do you want to know "Who hath believed?" "All are welcome to hear a discussion of the most important subject with which you will ever be confronted, the Seal of God," says the announcement.

WHEAT GROWERS FAVOR PROGRAM

The wheat production adjustment referendum is now underway among wheat growers of Jackson county, according to County Agent Robert C. Fowler. The vote, he says, is running about three to one in favor of continuation of the present wheat adjustment program. There are 104 wheatgrowers in the county eligible to vote.

Balls title of the referendum is: "Are you in favor of a wheat production program to follow the present one, which expires with the 1935 crop year?" All of the Jackson county wheat growers have not yet voted, according to Fowler. Meetings will be held this week to complete the voting. Ballots and tabulations must be in Washington, D. C. by May 25. The referendum is nation-wide, for the purpose of determining the sentiment of wheat men on the administration program for wheat.
