



BADMINTON CLUB PRESIDENT'S CUP TOURNEY TONIGHT

Badminton enthusiasts will have their second president's cup tournament tonight at the Badminton club's courts. Drawing for partners will start at 7:30 and players are urged to come early.

Trophies of the president's cup tournament series are on display in Larry Schade's window. One silver loving cup is for the winning woman and one for the winning man. Both players on the winning team of each tournament get 10 points and their names inscribed on the cups. Members of the runner-up team get five points. The first player to attain a total of 30 points is awarded permanent possession of the cup.

The Medford Badminton club is divided into two leagues—Blue Sox and Red Sox. Incidentally, there is also a sub-rose subdivision among the men into two minor leagues, the "Tarsans" and the "Smoothies." In the last tournament Nery Hayes and Bob Norris accumulated the highest total score in the Blue Sox league, and Frances Sparrow and Hob Douel the highest score in the Red Sox league. In the playoff match between the league winners the Hayes-Norris team, after a long battle, finally defeated the Sparrow-Douel team to earn 10 points toward the cup. The losing team won five points.

VANCOUVER DOG RACES HALTED UNTIL LEGALITY CAN BE THRESHED OUT

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 15.—(AP)—Dog races were but a memory, at least for the time being, in Vancouver today. The track was dark last night following Judge J. E. Stone's action in dissolving the temporary injunction, which had prevented officials from halting the races.

The Evergreen Kennel club's "donation system" by which the events were financed was declared illegal in an attorney general opinion last week, but Governor Martin's orders to patrolmen to halt the races had been thwarted for the time being when officials of the track secured a temporary restraining order Friday. Judge Stone's refusal to issue a permanent injunction yesterday, however, delayed operation of the "donation system" at least until the hearing on the constitutionality of the races set for June 18.

Chief William J. Cole of the state traffic patrol let it be known following yesterday's hearing that he would arrest the proprietors if races were held.

It was indicated the case would be appealed to the supreme court regardless of the outcome of the pending suit.

PETE KNOWS CURE FOR 'ROUGH GUYS'

BAR BABE DIDRICKSON AS GOLF CONTENDER ON PROFESSIONALISM

NEW YORK, May 15.—(AP)—A new golfing cause celebre threatened to develop today out of the disbarment of Mildred Babe Didrickson by the amateur status committee of the United States Golf association.

The greatest all-round woman athlete in this country's history, Miss Didrickson was ruled ineligible for amateur golf competition because of her professionalism in other states.

The decision, made "for the best interest of the game," prevents the famed Texan from playing not only in the southern tournament at Louisville next week but the National championship at Minneapolis in August. Miss Didrickson had set her heart on the latter.

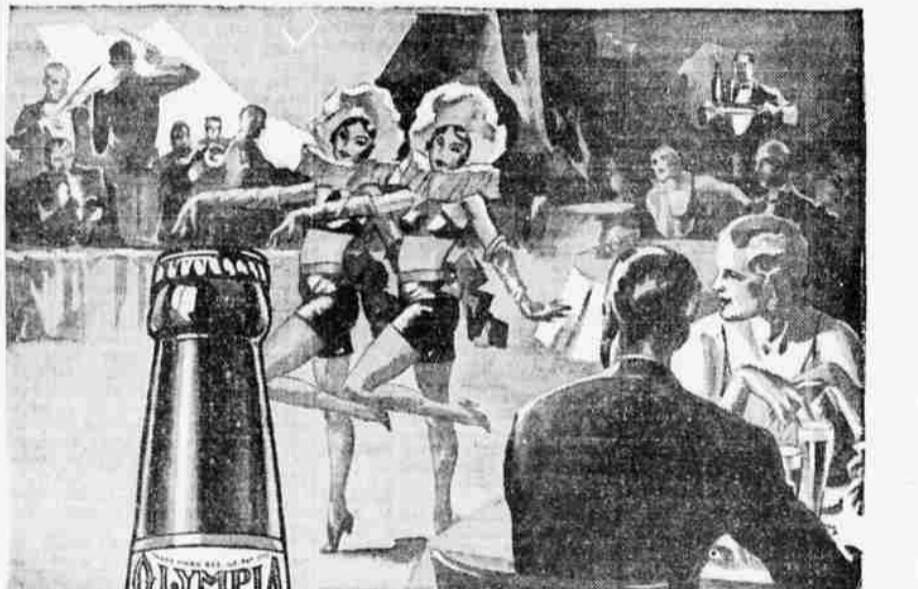

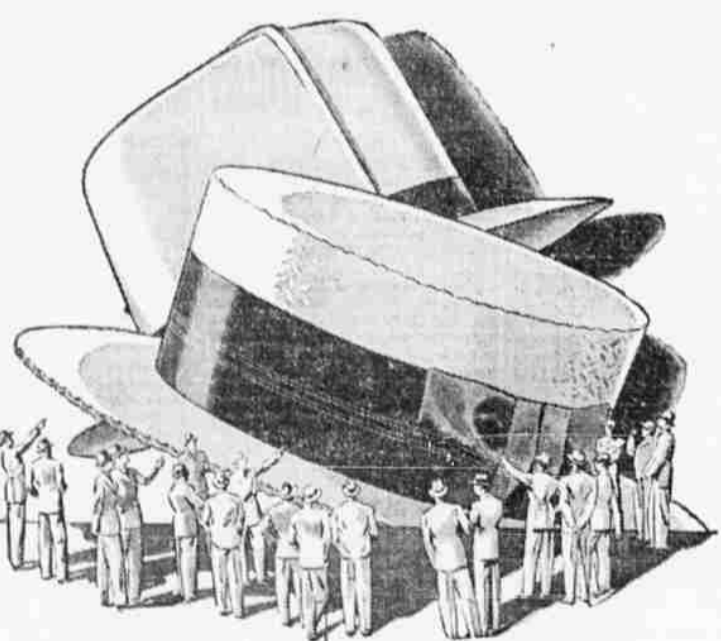
