EXPENSIVE STILLS REDUCED TO JUNK

PORTLAND, May 16.—(AP)—Federal agents yesterday cut the three zeros from \$85,000 worth of still equipment and confiscated liquor, leaving just about \$85 in junk.

Figures from the bureau of Internal revenue show that 2280 stills were seized in the United States the first three months of this year, compared to 1506 during the same period in 1934.
