**RE-ELECT MAULBETSCH PRESIDENT OF OREGON BAPTIST ASSOCIATION**

PENNINGTON, Ore., May 17.—(AP)—Dr. H. J. Maulbetsch of Portland was Thursday re-elected president of the Oregon Baptists' association at the close of the annual three-day conference here.

Dr. Maulbetsch, yesterday elected president of the Baptist men's group, resigned that position upon re-election to association leadership, and Dr. George Winslow of Bend will succeed him as head of the men's unit. A vice-president will be named later. The Rev. J. R. Turnbull of Albany

was elected vice-president; Dr. C. S. Tunnello of Portland, recording secretary; W. C. Sims of Portland, treasurer; Dr. C. O. Wright, historical secretary, and Dr. F. W. Starring of Portland, executive secretary.

Albany was awarded the 1936 convention.

The conference here was attended by 280 registered delegates from all parts of Oregon. The delegates made a pilgrimage to Weston for services at the tomb of David Lennox, founder of the first Baptist church in Oregon.

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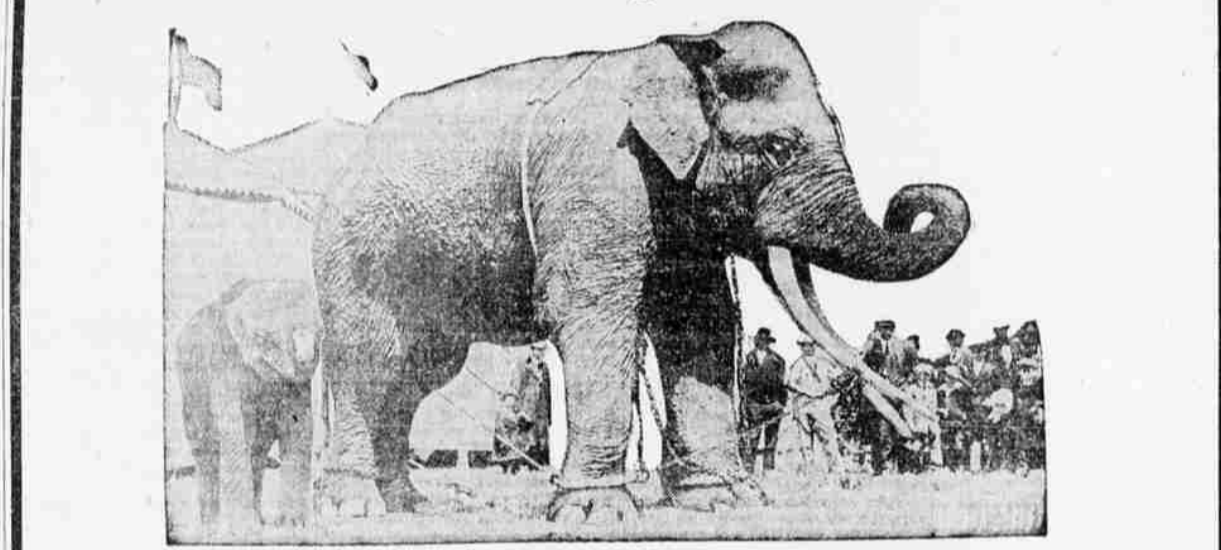
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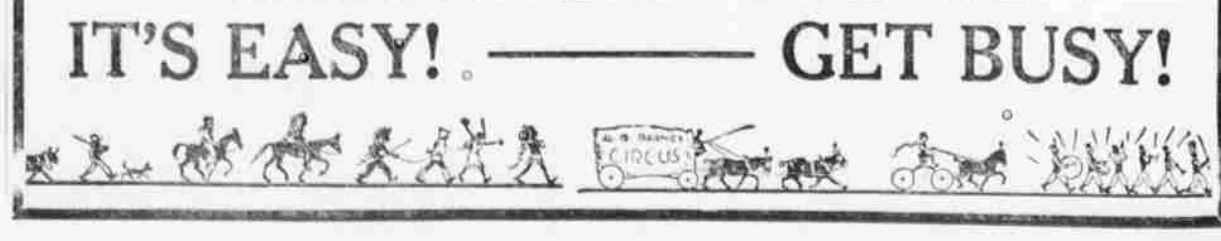
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
