



### BELCASTRO DOWNS GEORGE M'CLOUD IN EASY FASHION

With a swell lead sentence like "when Greek meets Greek they start a restaurant, but when Greek meets Wop they start a fight" already set up, the bulky Greek fire-eater, Demetrius, failed to appear for his scheduled bite and bend match with Pete Belcastro at the Armory last night and so Mark Lillard sent George M'Cloud into the fray to punch him.

It is doubtful, however, if M'Cloud, a newcomer here, and unused to the Belcastro method of handling recalcitrants, ever found out what hit him, the flashy Italian disposing of him in one-two style, in less than eight minutes of wrestling time.

M'Cloud showed some clever mat work in the clinch, proving himself adept at emerging from a Belcastro special hold now and then by the use of scientific grappling. It is particularly difficult, though, to apply science to a speeding locomotive, his one trip through the atmosphere onto the floor outside the ring having convinced him early in the second frame.

Belcastro looked fast and in good shape after his recent barn-storming trip through the east and south, and he has picked up several new ways of putting his feet in his opponent's

face, but his flying somnolence off the ropes is still his stock in trade. He served it piping hot to M'Cloud two or three times before that gentleman began to take steps to prevent it.

It took some time for Tony Catalano to arrive for the curtain raiser, and when he did arrive it didn't do him much good, losing two out of three to Johnny Soos, the fair-haired boy from Indiana. Soos was a busy individual during the evening's performance, running bare-footed about the ring in a great hurry, apparently trying to surround the mustachioed Italian.

One of the wild scenes of the first fall, which took 20 minutes, was when Catalano bit his way out of a bad situation, Soos, thinking that what's soos for the goose is soos for the gander, promptly tore across the ring and planted his benighted hands in Catalano's arm. Very funny, Catalano didn't think so, however, and returned to the wars by worrying Soos with a head lock to take the fall.

It took Soos just four minutes to even the count when he somnolenced the Italian into submission in the second.

The match finally went to Soos on a foul, after he had declined several offers from Referee Ray Frable to win by that route. At one point in the last canto, the lad from Indiana had Catalano by one arm, both feet under the had man's chops. From there it was a simple step to ring Tony's somewhat misshapen ear in his toes, giving it a brisk workout, much to the delight of the audience.

Soos challenged Belcastro, winner of the main event, to a meeting on next week's card.

### STATE TRAPSHOOT TO BRING GALAXY OF GUNNERS HERE

The Oregon state trap and skeet-shooting championship tournament to be held in Medford June 13 to 16 will be the largest of any state shoot held in the United States for many years. The entire program is amply financed and the money is in the bank. "Our only worry now is whether we will be able to handle the shooters on the fine local grounds without doubling the trap facilities," was the statement made today by T. E. Daniels, president of the Medford Gun club.

The local shooting grounds have been enlarged to accommodate as many shooters as competed in the state shoot at Portland last year, the largest in the United States, but already clubs that competed last year have advised the Medford club that they will send the largest delegations to the Medford shoot that have ever represented their respective cities.
