

ROGUES ALL SET TO GIVE G. PASS WARM RECEPTION

Hoosierites Tired of Occupying Cellar, Plan to Inaugurate New High School Field With Win Sunday

Baptism by fire will be given the new high school baseball field here Sunday, when the Medford Rogues, with a firm grip on the cellar position in the Southern Oregon league, attempt to knock the league-leading Grants Pass Merchants from their exalted position of three wins and no losses. The field, newly built, newly rolled and, with a mirror-like infield, will remove the hazards generally encountered in local fields, where outfielders must needs be a cross between a mountain goat and an aviator to handle even the easy ones. New stands will add greatly to the comfort of the fans, also, with an uninterrupted view from all angles.

With what is generally conceded to be the finest and fastest infield in the circuit, the Rogues enter the fray under rather peculiar conditions, they are actually favored to take the tilt.

The only thing that kept them from doing just that last week was that disastrous seventh inning, when big "Speedball" Thompson momentarily lost his deadly control and walked four men in rapid succession. Thus he is a dangerous man to face when "on," is a fact that the Cavemien are quite ready to accept, however.

Using no set method of delivery, Thompson slips his three home strikes overhead, sidarm or underhand so fast that they come past the plate looking like golf balls. Still a bill leary of that control, Manager Hoffman has Jack Strickland, another giant and a knuckle-ball expert with perfect control, ready to take over the duties at any time if conditions seem to warrant the change.

The Rogues infield is leading the league in double plays, and the only thing that will stop them Sunday, according to Hoffman, is sudden and violent death. He wants to win this game, and intends to do so. While a win here would still leave them in the cellar, the Rogues would at least have some percentage for a starter for their late season spurt.

While the Rogues and Merchants are settling their differences here, the Ashland Lithians will hold a party for the Klamath Red Sox, who last week drubbed the Grants Pass side to the bitter time of 11-2. This inning may prove another upset, if the temperamental Lithians hit the form they used to defeat the Rogues two weeks ago. The pill-box Ashland field may have something to do with an Ashland win, also, those who have seen Ashland home games ever.

Sunday's game here will see the league's two heaviest hitters pitted against each other—the venerable Al Droleite of Grants Pass, with a percentage of .371, and "Grandpa" Hoffard, knocking out an impressive .461 for Medford. Both men have been playing pro and semi-pro ball longer than most of the league men have been alive.

OAKLAND CRIMPS BID OF SERAPHS FOR LEAGUE LEAD

Los Angeles' bid for first place in Pacific Coast standings was stopped, temporarily at least, today after losing to the league-leading Oakland club 4 to 1 yesterday.

Portland's newest acquisition to the pitching ranks, Chandler Spurgeon, who was sent from the Yankees, buried the Ducks to their third straight over Sacramento last night, 4 to 3.

He allowed only four hits and one run until the ninth when the Solons landed on him for four hits and two runs. Then with two men on bases he calmly struck out Pinch Hitter Tony Borja to retire the side.

Gabby Street's Missions further entrenched themselves in the league's basement by losing the fourth straight to Hollywood, 6 to 2. Vinco Di Maggio poled out two singles and a homer with Smead Jolley on the paths, for three runs.

Manager "Lefty" O'Doul unwrapped his split thumb and went into left field in the second game against Seattle to prevent the Indians from making a clean sweep of the series. The Seals lost the first of the double bill 5 to 4 and won the nightcap 4 to 2.
