

ITALY NOW READY FOR ANY TRIAL IS BOAST OF IL DUCE

Boy Soldiers Are Massed Throughout Nation for Ceremony of Oath of Fealty Fascist Hierarchy

ROME, Italy, May 24.—(AP)—Premier Benito Mussolini told massed thousands of soldiers and civilians today:

"Italy now is ready for any trial." His declaration came in the course of observance of the 20th anniversary of Italy's entrance into the world war, a ceremony which included the presenting of battle flags to regiments which replace units assigned to East Africa.

His listeners packed Venezia square, in front of his office. They heard him say:

"The words of an unknown Italian soldier scrawled on the wall of a house demolished by a shell: 'It is better to live one day as a lion than 100 days as a lamb' are not merely an order—they are gospel for us."

"In spite of anyone" "We swear to respect this sacred injunction everywhere and in spite of anyone."

He added: "Let no one in Italy or abroad delude themselves. Italy will consider carefully before arriving at a decision, but when the decision is reached, then she will go forward without turning back."

"It is necessary, once we have started, to burn our ships and guide ourselves along the road of destiny with a firm hand."

King Victor Emmanuel and Mussolini stood before the tomb of the unknown soldier, in the shadow of Il Duce's office building, and presented battle flags to 16 regiments composing the six divisions just constituted to take the places of those sent or about to be sent to Africa.

The ceremony was attended by 20,000 soldiers and black-shirted fascists.

Troops for Africa
Despite the lack of official statement, all Italian newspapers today stated that these divisions were destined for East Africa, thus making a total of at least 10,000 men in the regular army alone.

Before the battle flag presentation, Mussolini had presided over a fascist "riva," the graduation exercises for fascist youth from one organization into another.

Half a million of Italy's youth—boys and girls ranging from 8 to 22—stood at attention in hundreds of towns and cities throughout the nation, taking an oath of fealty to Il Duce and his directives.

In Rome more than 10,000 of the youngsters massed on the Via Dei Impero, where they were reviewed by Il Duce and the fascist hierarchy.

500,000 Rookies
The almost 500,000 youngsters who participated in ceremonies throughout the nation today constitute only a small part of the 4,397,288 members of the Opera Nazionale Balilla, or national youth movement.

"They were merely the 'rookies' or those who have reached the age limit of one class and were formally mustered into the ranks of another."

Thus 178,789 balilla who have just passed into their fourteenth year, appeared for the first time this morning in the ranks of the avanguardisti where they will stay for four years of study, drill and physical exercise.

They receive real rifles in ceremonies held in their various encampments after taking their oaths. Many sections of them were formed with machine gun companies, others with artillery, naval, aviation, tank and radio signal units.

HIGH COURT SETS WATSON HEARING

Notice has been received that the state supreme court has set May 31 as the date for hearing of arguments in the civil suit of Dan Watson

against George L. Jantzer and Jackson county.

The action concerns the purchase by Jantzer, from Jackson county, of a timber claim in the Prospect district on a delinquent tax certificate. Watson, as owner of the claim, contests the right of the county to sell the land for delinquent taxes and the validity of Jantzer's purchase. Jantzer is a sawmill operator of the district. The constitutionality of the Oregon law, giving the county the right to sell land for taxes, is questioned.

Watson is represented by Attorney George M. Roberts, the county by District Attorney George A. Coddling and Jantzer by Attorney Frank Newman.

PAIR NABBED HERE FACE INDICTMENT

PORTLAND, May 24.—(AP)—The federal grand jury yesterday returned

20 indictments, 16 of them containing charges of liquor violations in various forms.

Jack O'Connell King and W. E. Finnegan of Medford were charged with sending an extortion letter through the mails. Illegal possession of liquor was charged in the case of George E. Stone of Klamath Falls. Among those indicted for alleged sale of liquor to Indians were seven Klamath Falls men—Will Green, Benny Gardner, John William Rose, Charles Edgar Davis, Charles Nelson Myers, Ed F. Hall and Loren A. Turner.

King and Finnegan were arrested in Medford, May 8, at the Medford postoffice, by state and federal officers. They had gone to the post-office to get the money that they are alleged to have demanded of a woman, reputedly a friend of King's, in San Francisco. Both men had been staying at the transient camp here, and Finnegan had been arrested by city police on a charge of being drunk, and ordered to leave town, or Judge Allen D. Curry, only a short time before he was apprehended on the extortion charge.
