

PICTURE ACTORS ALSO POSE FOR STILLS BY GROSS

HOLLYWOOD, May 24.—(UP)—To count the millions of still photographs taken annually in Hollywood would be impossible, but estimates disclose that the average star of the first magnitude poses for approxi-

ately 10,000 separate pictures each year.

How they find time to do it when they are making anywhere from two to six pictures a year? John Engstead, who arranges the sittings for one of the studios explains that each time a star visits the portrait gallery anywhere from 100 to 150 separate poses are taken.

These go to supply the constantly increasing demand of fan and film magazines and newspapers. And every picture must be approved by an official censor in the Hays office.

Of course there are other pictures that are a part of the studio routine—"special stills," a set of which is made for each production for advertising purposes, fashion pictures and straight news photos.

Then there are the "set" stills, taken for the benefit of the property department and the assistant directors,

so that a set, once broken down, can be duplicated quickly in case of re-takes.

The greatest difficulty of posing portraits lies in finding a new pose for each picture. Engstead said. Some stars have posed for as many as 200-000 pictures under his direction. He hopes they all looked just a bit different.

Carole Lombard, Claudette Colbert and Marlene Dietrich are the stars who have reached the 200,000 mark. Jean Harlow, Joan Crawford and Loretta Young probably also are in this category.

Engstead's greatest cross is the temperamental actress who hates to pose for portraits. Claudette loathes her visits to the gallery because she thinks she isn't beautiful!

The waste of film seems enormous with millions of photographs taken each year, half of which may never

be printed, still no waiting is heard from the neighborhood of Eastman and DuPont.

WIPING RAG FRAUD REVEALED IN NAVY SUPPLY PURCHASE

LOS ANGELES, May 24.—(AP)—A purported "wiping rag fraud" on the navy, said to have involved nearly \$7000 a month in cash and potential danger of damage to naval efficiency and marksmanship in time of war, was revealed to the federal grand jury today by agents of the naval intelligence department.

Federal authorities predicted the

indictment of several persons in connection with the alleged fraud when the grand jury completes its investigation tomorrow.

The navy was said to have contracted for the supply of more than 100,000 pounds of cotton rags of a specified quality monthly to be used for polishing purposes.

Navy agents revealed their investigations showed that after the rags were inspected and baled, the bales were broken open and an inferior quality material which would not absorb oil was substituted.

The damage to the navy was incalculable, Assistant United States Attorney William Fleet Palmer said. He explained that the oil absorbing quality of the rags was most important in polishing and cleaning the inside of the big guns and mechanism of the fleet.

Failure to do its work, he said, would

be reflected in lowered efficiency and marksmanship.

Substituted for the rags, officials said, were lace curtains, heavy work trousers and burlap.

The present inquiry marks the second within a year initiated here by the navy intelligence unit.

The first inquiry brought indictment of several wholesale poultry dealers accused of defrauding the government.

College President Resigns.
ASHLAND, Ohio.—(UP)—Dr. Edwin E. Jacobs, president of Ashland College for 12 years, has submitted his resignation. In his resignation Dr. Jacobs recommended the appointment of Dr. Charles L. Anspach, former dean at Ashland College, resigned recently from the faculty of Michigan State Normal College at Ypsilanti.

May Oppose Steel Mayors.
MARTINS FERRY, Ohio.—(UP)—Steel mill employees, who are mayors of two Ohio river towns, may have steel mill workers as opponents in the November election. Paul Hamilton wants to be nominated to run against Edgar Irwin, of Martins Ferry, and Raymond McEndree has announced in opposition to Mayor J. G. Armitage, of Tiltonville. All are steel workers.

Old Boat to Sink in Land.
SANDUSKY, Ohio.—(UP)—Boats which have outlived their usefulness on the Great Lakes and are in various decadent stages in slips along the Lake Erie waterfront here may be used for "filling in" in a reclamation project here. City Manager Robert L. J. Wagar said he believed at least a score of "wrecks" could be used.
