TRANSIENT CAMP 'WALLINGFORD'S' BUBBLE BURSTS

TULSA, Okla., May 24.—(UP)—Smooth-talking Tex Baxter, tired of the transient camp and tatter-patched life, opened a \$1,000,000 tank company which made this oil-rich city gasp.

Several hours later, when police and merchants took back his \$15,000 home and 10-room hotel suite offices, they found him penniless and with only a handful of "antiques" or second-hand cigar butts in his pocket.

Retracing his operations, police discovered that Baxter built up his business on the strength of a neatly-pressed but well-worn suit and a hand-made bank book.

The bank book purported to show deposits of \$500,000 in an eastern bank. With this "credit" Baxter purchased an \$11,000 home and \$4000 worth of furnishings for it.

He rented the hotel suite for the offices of his "tank company," established therein a stenographer and sent a housekeeper and valet to his home. He faked telegrams to show that his company had the backing of an eastern concern and voted himself large blocks of stock. Then he arranged with a railroad to build a mile of switch track to the site of his plant.

He was about to purchase the site and begin building when the housekeeper called police because he had not given her pay in advance that he promised.

Back went Baxter to the transient camp with a police escort to get some belongings. He went to a shoebox and took out an FERA order on a Tulsa dentist to pull a tooth.

fense Attorney Samuel Liebowitz had skillfully drawn from Steinmetz's trembling lips the accused youth's version of the double killing in the Knights of Columbus hotel November 26.

Each time he told it, Steinmetz carried the recital to where he said he saw the priest and his wife kiss.

then declared his memory went blank until he was awakened in a room across the hall by police shouting at him: "You killed the priest."

"I don't remember," he cried. "My mind was asleep. It was like a bad dream."

Clings to Story
Deathly pale, with tears streaming down his face, he stubbornly clung to this story as prosecutors pounded at this strongest link in his defense—temporarily insanity.

He told of following to the priest's room, where the deranged cleric had taken the pretty girl for "confession" after an all-day drinking bout by the trio. He listened as the key hole.

"I heard my wife protest: 'Father, I'm a married woman.'" Steinmetz testified. "Father Leonard replied:

"You can't question the authority of the church."

"I knocked on the door and said I was a bell boy. Father Leonard admitted me. He was partly undressed."

"At first I didn't see my wife. Then I saw her crouching behind his bed, struggling to get her slip on over her head."
