FLOWER SHOW OF MEDFORD GARDEN CLUB THIS WEEK

Annual Event To Be Held At Courthouse Tuesday and Wednesday — Classifications and Rules.

The Medford Garden club's annual flower show will be held in the corridors of the courthouse Tuesday and Wednesday May 28 and 29.

The classification used previous years has been changed somewhat and has been arranged as follows:

Class I—Roses
 Division 1: Single specimens.
 Division 2: (a) Three hybrid tea perennials roses; (b) hybrid perpetual roses; (c) single roses.
 Division 3: (a) A single spray of a climbing rose; (b) three sprays of a climbing rose.
 Division 4: (a) Arrangement of roses in any container; (b) basket or bowl of climbers.

Class II—Iris
 Division 1: German Iris; (a) Single

spike of any variety; (b) three spikes of one named variety.
 Division 2: Spanish Iris; (a) Single spike; (b) three spikes.
 Division 3: Siberian Iris; (a) Single spike; (b) three spikes.
 Division 4: Japanese Iris; (a) Single spike; (b) three spikes.
 Division 5: Arrangement of Iris—any color or variety.
Class III—Poppies
 Division 1: Oriental—any number, color or arrangement.
 Division 2: Any other kind—any number, color or arrangement.
Class IV—Peonies
 Division 1: Single specimens.
 Division 2: Three stems—one variety.
 Division 3: Arrangement of peonies—any color, number or variety.
 All other flowers not mentioned above have been grouped into artistic arrangements.
Class V—Artistic Arrangements
 Division 1: In glass containers.
 Division 2: In pottery containers.
 Division 3: In metal containers.
 Division 4: In basket containers.
 Division 5: In containers to match the color of the flowers.
 Division 6: In kitchen ware containers.
Division 7: Japanese Arrangement.
Rules and Regulations
Flower Show
 1. All entries must be in by 11 a. m. Tuesday, May 28.
 2. There will be only one judging of exhibits, and that on the first day of the show.
 3. In classes covering artistic arrangements, exhibitors must furnish their own containers and arrange

their own exhibits.
 4. Exhibitors must state to which class each entry belongs, but the staging committee has full power to correct a classification.
 5. All roses exhibited in competition must be from plants which have been grown by and have been the exclusive property of the exhibitor for at least two months immediately preceding the exhibition.
 6. Two or more persons may not exhibit in the same division from the same garden.
 7. Where a certain number of roses on stems are designated, three must be neither more nor less than that number entered in the exhibit.
 8. Ribbons on baskets disqualify exhibits.
 9. All roses, iris and peonies must be correctly named, as otherwise the exhibit may be disqualified at the discretion of the judges.
 10. Exhibits cannot be removed before 9 p. m. Wednesday, May 29. Flowers to be returned to exhibitor when so desired. Otherwise they will be distributed to those calling for them Thursday morning.
 11. Exhibitors may not disturb or remove exhibit without permission of staging committee.
 12. The flower show will be formally opened at 2 p. m. Tuesday, May 28, and continued until a late hour Wednesday.

ROSES FROM SKY TO HONOR BARBER

In connection with the Barber Memorial air show on Memorial day, May 30, a tribute from the air will be paid to Newell Barber, young Medford aviator shot down during the World war, when roses are sprinkled over the Medford cemetery at high noon.

Lo. Barber, a young man who emulated his own record, was one of the first American war-birds to go. He was shot down in France from a great height while on reconnaissance duty. His body was never recovered.

Barber Field, the first airport field in Oregon, was named for him. It was located at the Jackson county fair grounds just south of this city.

The parents of Lt. Barber, Dr. and Mrs. M. C. Barber, are now residents of Stellaquam, Washington.
