BOTH ISSUES WIN IN CITY ELECTION, LIGHT VOTE CAST

Marked by an exceptionally light vote, the special city election Friday nevertheless resulted in both issues being carried by substantial margins. The measure to authorize the city council to refund approximately \$230,000 in outstanding improvement bonds at a low rate of interest carried by a vote of 224 yeas, 24 nays. The second measure, to continue payment of the city's 15 per cent contribution for SERA relief work within the city, carried by a vote of 197 yeas, 35 nays. The totals show that only approximately 230 went to the polls.

At a special meeting of the city council Saturday morning, to officially canvass the votes, an ordinance was passed authorizing the refunding upon the first dates of interest payment of approximately \$140,000 of the bonds, most of which are Bancroft. The semi-annual interest dates for these bonds occur on July 1 and January 1, next, at which time the bonds will be refunded at later dates. With interest rates four percent instead of five and a half per cent, the city will be saved between \$2000 and \$3000 annually in interest charges by passage of this measure. Under the present relief set-up, the city pays laborers' compensation, and for materials used within the city in the amount of 15 per cent of the total sum given over for relief work. Passage of the bill to continue this contribution will mean contribution of a payroll of approximately \$22,000 monthly to the heads of about 800 relief families.

SPORTSMEN URGED TO ATTEND MEET

If other business matters are cleared up in time, it is hoped also to form plans tomorrow night for a banquet in the near future celebrating closure of the Coast Times.
