



ROGUES TRAMPLE GILMORE, 11 TO 0, TO CLING CLAIMS

Really exacting the last full ounce of flesh, the Medford Rogues avenged their last year's defeat at the hands of the Gilmore Lions by trampling out a 11-0 wallop at the fairgrounds yesterday.

The Rogues tallied nine runs in the first two innings in a slugfest that had the Lions helpless. McLean, chucking for the Rogues and receiving excellent support in the field, pitched the first shut-out game the Rogues have taken this year.

Heat, after those first two disastrous innings, settled down and pitched a faultless ball, and the game was fairly even from then on. Each team gathered four hits in the last seven innings.

After the game, Manager "Hoosier" Hoffer of the Rogues had no comment to make other than to say his team got the nine runs he asked of them, and the extra two were just for good measure. Other Rogues players expressed only relief that they would no longer have to listen to "impudent remarks" from the Lions.

Bob Lewis, manager of the Lions, said after the game: "We have no excuse to make. We consider the defeat a stinging disgrace, but we have two more games in which to redeem ourselves. Our record shows that we're really not as bad as we looked yesterday."

The two teams meet again July 28. The games stand one each for the two teams now, Gilmore having taken an 8-0 game from the Rogues last year.

Hoffer announced today that Woodyard, star shortstop, may leave shortly to play for the Coquille nine, and in that event John "Deacon" Carvie, a graduate of Notre Dame, will hold down the shortstop berth. Carvie formerly played with the Indianapolis club, and has seen action in the first American Association.

Another Rogues newcomer is Lockwood, a southpaw pitcher from Lockwood, with a nasty curve ball. He has tried out with the Missions several times, Hoffer stated.

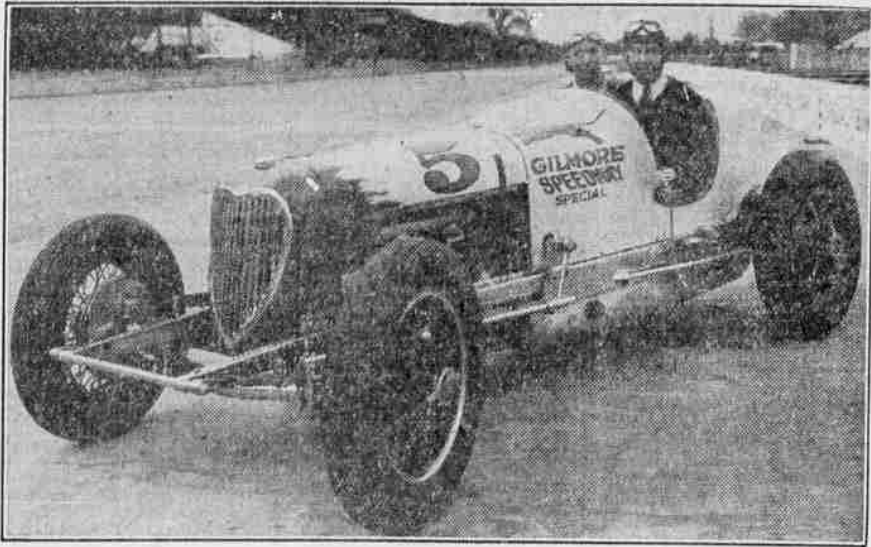

Sets Record for Indianapolis Classic

Pettillo drove the entire distance without relief and made only two stops at the Gilmore pits for fuel and to change tires.

AERIAL PROGRAM ATTRACTS CROWD TO CITY'S PORT

Lead-in skies and a bitter wind failed to dim the enthusiasm of Medford residents for air spectacles, when between 1,500 and 2,000 persons attended the Barber-McKinney Memorial Air Show at the municipal airport yesterday. The program opened with the sprinkling of roses on the cemetery at high noon, and at 2 o'clock the show began.

Loops, spins, wing over turns, Immelman turns, dives, and all the twists and turns that go to make up stunt flying were unrelieved for the audience, along with formation flights, with local and out of town ships participating.

Next on the program was "bombing" from the air, with sacks of flour in lieu of explosives. The object was to hit a mark on the ground, and considering the lack of practice, fair shots were made.

An unexpected attraction was added to the show when a squadron of five Boeing pursuit planes arrived, escorting a large Hellanca cabin ship. All six ships were from Pearson field in Vancouver.

Jerry "Diavolo" Smith concluded the show with a parachute drop, despite the fact that a strong wind was blowing. He has made over 500 jumps, though not having jumped for the last four years. He said after the leap that it was as great a thrill as his first time down.

In jumping from a plane, the jumper lands at about the same speed he would in leaping from the top of a box car, and an added wind makes the experience similar to jumping from a moving box car, Smith said.

He will remain in Medford for some time, packing whites and flying for the Arnie Air school here. He stated that several local "daredevils" are planning on making parachute drops. He is a licensed parachute rigger.

Aspersions Cast On Lithians' Field Heat Sister City Players and Fans—Klamath Going to G. Pass

Southern Oregon league's first really crucial game will be played at Grants Pass next Sunday when the Klamath Falls Red Sox, in second place and only one game behind the leaders, tangle with Jake Gipe's Grants Pass Merchants, holders of the top spot.

While those two teams are fighting it out, Ashland and Medford will be battling at the Jackson county fairgrounds in one of their "blood" games, with the stake nothing more than just another ball game.

Manager Hoffer of the Rogues will start either "Speedball" Thompson or Strickland on the mound against the Lithians. Ashland will counter with Arnold Bauman or Bill Kannasto. Bauman is a lefthander and was the pitcher that beat Medford three weeks ago for the Lithians' only victory.

Back of the plate for Medford will be Billy Calvert and for Ashland will be Cliff "Chief" McLean, recently appointed manager of the Lithians with the resignation of John Miljus.

Feeling between Ashland and Medford, never of the friendliest, is more bitter now than at any time within the past few years. Ashland players and fans resent the statements Medford players made after their game three weeks ago that the left field fence at Ashland was only 150 feet from home plate and challenge anyone to make actual measurements and find out for themselves that it is a full 250 feet from the plate. And also, that there is no ditch directly back of the catcher, but that there is 30 feet of smooth ground from the plate to the newly constructed backstop.

So it looks like two red hot ball games next Sunday, one really "cruel" and one really "bloodthirsty."

PETILLO RISKED LAST PENNY TO GET INTO RACE

Former Los Angeles Truck Driver Collects \$20,000 First Prize, Thousands More in Added Awards

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31.—(AP)—Daring 30-year-old Kelly Pettillo who risked his last penny to get in the race, claimed the victor's spoils today for the fastest 500 miles ever turned on the death-ridden bricks of the Indianapolis motor speedway.

The Los Angeles Italian-American, celebrating "the first time a car ever stayed together" for him, whipped his powerful little cream-colored speedster across the finish line before a record crowd of 155,000 fans yesterday for a 500-mile average of 106.240 miles an hour. He will collect a \$20,000 cash first prize, \$2,050 in lap prizes and thousands more for accessories.

Marred by Fatality

The nation's greatest speed spectacle was marred by another fatality, the fourth for the 1935 classic and the 31st since the 2 1/2-mile oval was opened to the racing daredevils in 1909.

Clay Weatherly, 25, Cincinnati driver, at the wheel of the doomed race car that killed Johnny Hannon of Norristown, Pa., in a trial run May 21, rode it over the wall of the northwest turn at 110 miles an hour on the eighth lap. A "slow" signal from his pit crew had gone unheeded. He was dead when picked up. His mechanic, Francis Bradburn, 23, of Indianapolis, remained in a critical condition in a hospital today, his back broken.

Pettillo, former Los Angeles fruit truck driver who turned to racing in the past five years, winner of the pole position in the 1934 race here, almost failed to qualify this year. He flashed through the 25-mile qualifying test at record speed but used more gasoline than the rules allow. On his second trial, a broken connecting rod scattered parts of his motor all along the bricks. He scraped

together enough money to rebuild the car, and won.

Wife Sees Race

The winner's wife, Mrs. Valentine Pettillo, who was at the track with their 9-year-old son, said: "When I saw Kelly out in front I knew he would win if he didn't run out of gasoline. I just held my breath and waited for him to get the last lap finished."

Pettillo followed the pace set at the start by Rex Maya, Los Angeles, who had the pole and held it until broken axle bolts forced him out at 305 miles. The winner, once in front, had an easy time of it, finishing two miles ahead of Wilbur Shaw of Indianapolis and five miles in front of Wild Bill Cummings, the 1934 victor and who saw his record of 104.863 miles an hour go into the discard.
