WOMAN TO GAIN MOTHERHOOD BY USE OF HORMONE

Hope for Childless Through New Discovery Announced by Physicians in Wisconsin School Experiment

MADISON, Wis., May 31.—(AP)—A sociologist and two physicians of the University of Wisconsin today disclosed success of experiments which they said pointed a way to motherhood for many women hitherto childless through misfortunes of nature.

The results will be reported to national medical meetings in June.

The use of a pituitary hormone extract to achieve a natural pregnancy in a 38-year-old woman previously thought to be sterile was described by Dr. Ralph E. Campbell and Elmer L. Sevinghaus of the Wisconsin medical school. They collaborated with Dr. Frederick L. Hisaw, a leader in research in the hormones of reproduction.

At the same time, the three scientists described hormone injections which they said had eased severe periodic pains suffered by some women because of a functional disorder.

The physicians withheld the name of a woman who they said will soon become a mother through success of their work.

Childless through 15 years, the couple had sought aid of several physicians. A special examination revealed inactive glands for which researchers planned and administered the hormone treatments.

The physicians said that the use of the injections was limited to instances in which sterility was traceable to a few types of functional disorders.

"On the basis of limited clinical experience with humans," they said in a joint statement, "we believe that some of the pituitary hormones may prove effective in overcoming many cases of sterility."

Cool Peppermint Flavor Gives This Dessert Zest



COOL, refreshing peppermint flavored tapioca cream, topped with chocolate sauce, makes a noteworthy and novel dessert.

That popular flavor, coffee, lends its inimitable touch to another dessert. In these recipes you have two more dessert surprises to spring on the family and on guests.

Peppermint Chocolate Cream
1/2 cup quick-cooking tapioca
1/2 cup crushed peppermint candy
1 egg yolk
4 cups milk
1 egg-white, stiffly beaten

Combine quick-cooking tapioca, salt, candy, egg yolk, and milk in top of double boiler and stir enough to break egg yolk. Place over rapidly boiling water, bring to scalding point (allow 5 to 7 minutes), and cook 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Remove from boiling water. Fold a small amount into egg white; add to remaining tapioca mixture and blend. Chill—mixture thickens as it cools. Serve in sherbet glasses with chocolate sauce. Serves 8.

Coffee Carnival
1 1/2 cups water
1/3 cup quick-cooking tapioca
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup seedless raisins
1 cup strong coffee
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup cream, whipped

Place water in top of double boiler and bring to a boil over direct heat. Combine dry ingredients; add gradually to water, then add raisins, and bring to a brisk boil, stirring constantly. Place immediately over rapidly boiling water and cook 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from boiling water—mixture clears and thickens as it cools. When slightly cool, add coffee and vanilla. Chill; fold in cream. Serve in sherbet glasses. Serves 6.
