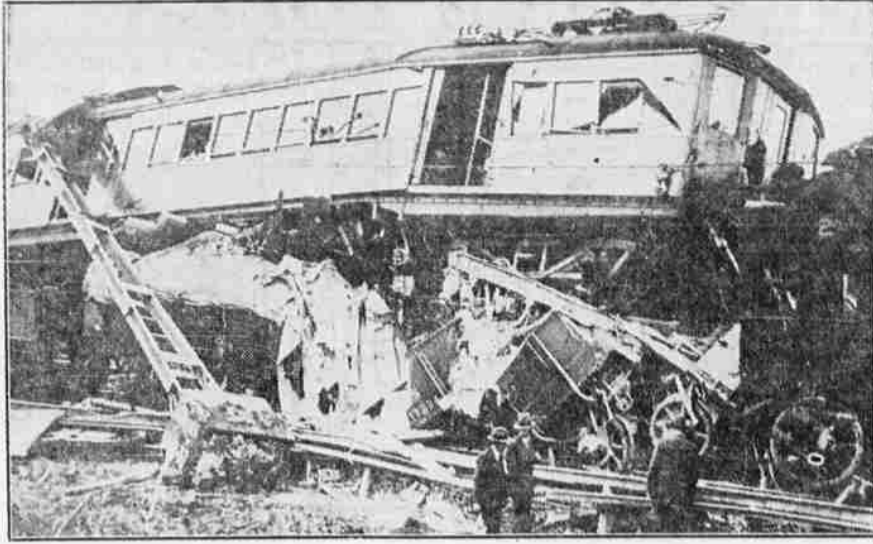
GANDHI SNUBS 'RICHEST GIRL'

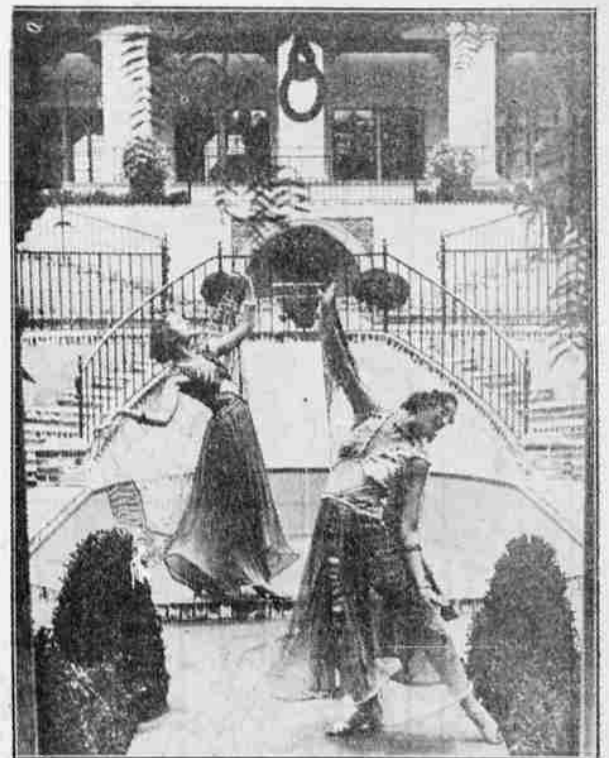


ELECTRIC TRAIN CLIMBS ANOTHER IN UNUSUAL WRECK
