



# BABE RUTH QUILTS BRAVES; CLAIMING DOUBLE-CROSSED

## Home-Run Slugger Could Not Get Along With Fuchs, President of Club—Seeks Place On Retired List.

BOSTON, June 3.—(AP)—Standing by his ultimatum that he would "never play another game for the Boston Braves as long as Fuchs (President Emil Fuchs) remains in control," Babe Ruth left Boston today for his New York home.

Ruth, who was accompanied by his wife, their two daughters and his mother-in-law, drove away in a big sedan. A wedding had crowded the lobby of his hotel and Ruth was forced to shoulder his way through the throng. The wedding guests showered Ruth with rice intended for the bride and bridegroom.

At the club Bill McKenzie, manager of the Braves, shook the hand of the departing Babe.

Ruth, it was understood, was anxious to arrive in New York to participate in the reception for the new French liner Normandie.

BOSTON, June 3.—(AP)—Babe Ruth and the Boston Braves have parted. Baseball's mighty slugger was made a free agent yesterday, soon after he announced he was quitting the National league team because of a dispute with Judge Emil Fuchs, president of the Braves.

"I can't get along with Fuchs," the home-run slugging Babe explained, as he sang the swan song for one of the most glamorous of baseball careers.

Fuchs crossed him.

"I will never play another game for the Boston Braves, although I have the highest regard for my Boston teammates and their manager, Bill McKenzie, one of the finest players the game has ever produced. Fuchs double-crossed me and I will not play for the club as long as he remains in control."

Shortly after the Babe announced his voluntary retirement, Fuchs announced that he had given him his unconditional release.

It is likely that the resignation of Ruth, hailed as the financial salvation of the financially embarrassed Braves, will cause an upheaval in the club's upstairs office.

The incident may hasten the passage of complete control of the Braves into the hands of Charles F. Adams, owner of two Boston professional hockey clubs, guiding genius of the \$1,500,000 Suffolk Downs horse-racing track in East Boston, and controlling stockholder of the National league baseball club here.

Seeks Retired List.

The aging and ailing home-run monarch, who was expected to lift by its boys, the Braves into the big-money class, told baseball writers yesterday that he intended to petition the baseball authorities for a place on the National league retired list.

Some time ago, it became known in baseball circles, the Babe became irritated because he had been denied a share of the club's record spring training season profits. This disagreement, it is understood, caused the breach between him and Fuchs.

But Ruth cited a different reason for quitting baseball. He said he desired to go on the retired list when Fuchs refused him permission to go to New York to participate in the ceremonies in honor of the French liner Normandie's arrival.

## Hardy Bombarded From Box in Fifth Frame—Locals Lead, 16-2, Until Ashland Solves Lockwood Floaters

Knocking Pitcher Hardy of Ashland out of the box in the 5th inning, the Medford Rogues ran in nine runs in that frame at the fairgrounds field yesterday to win from the Ashland Lithians 18-12 in a wild slugfest that saw the locals out 18 hits, and the Ashland nine chalk up 18.

At one point in the game the Rogues were leading 16-2, but early in the 7th Ashland began to find Lockwood's slow curve, and tallied eight runs of their own to narrow the margin considerably, and cause Manager "Hoosier" Hoffard to send Hess onto the mound in an attempt to check the scoring spree.

Lockwood's peculiar halting delivery of floaters had the Lithians wildly finishing their swings before the ball ever arrived, but once they got onto the unusual timing, they hammered him out of the lot. Hess faltered a bit when he first entered the fray, walking the first man up, but steadied later and turned in a good performance.

Gus Arnible, Medford second baseman substantially boosted his batting average with four hits out of five trips to the plate, two of them being three-baggers. Had the tending star, who has made but four errors in the field all year, been a trifle faster on his feet, at least one of his hits would have been a circuit clout.

Other highlights for the Rogues were the performances of Cavelli at short, and Courtney in the outfield, whose long throw in from the outfield held the Lithians in check several times. In the fifth, Hardy walked Donovan, filling the bases, in the hope that Cavelli would fan. This he refused to do, rapping out a hot line drive that scored two runners. The flashy ex-Notre Dame star also figured in five assists, a tie with Hardy for a game record.

Woodward also turned in a sweet performance, making two circus catches and holding down third base duties after Donovan had pulled a tendon. Donovan's injury was not serious. It was learned after the game.
