

185 LIVES LOST, MANY HOMELESS IN PLAINS REGION

where the Republican river's flood crest struck yesterday and four persons were drowned.

A. C. Tilley, Nebraska state engineer, said there was no crossable bridge in the 250-mile length of the Republican river from the southwest corner of Nebraska to Clay Center, Kansas.

Thousands Homeless. R. R. Hartford, another engineer, estimated property damage in Nebraska would reach \$12,000,000. In the other five states the aggregate property damage was estimated by officials at \$5,000,000.

At Jefferson City, Mo., the rising flood waters of the Missouri river forced removal of 139 trusty inmates from the prison farms. Some were taken to safety in boats. One convict was drowned. The others aided guards in saving livestock and farm equipment.

COURT PONDERING WATSON'S CLAIMS

Oral arguments were made last Friday before the state supreme court in the appeal of Dan Watson against George L. Jantzer and Jackson county, by District Attorney George A. Coddine, representing Jackson county; Attorney Frank J. Newman, representing Jantzer, and Attorney George M. Roberts, representing Watson. No decision by the high court is anticipated for a month. A number of Jackson county residents, who made similar land purchases, are interested in the final legal outcome.

Watson in his appeal attacks the validity of the Oregon law giving the counties right to sell land for delinquent taxes.

Jantzer, a sawmill operator of the Prospect district, purchased the timber claim owned by Watson, from the county, and upon which approximately \$30 in taxes were due. After the transfer of title, Watson filed suit and tendered the back taxes. The lower court held the sale valid.

GROCERY BUILDING WILL BE MODERN

Laura D. Stewart, owner for the past two and a half years of the Rose grocery store on West Jackson street, today was granted a building permit to erect a new grocery store building at the corner of Jackson and Holly streets, at an approximate cost of \$2,000.

The new store, Mrs. Stewart said today, will be the ultra modern of the English type. It will be affiliated with the I. G. A. system, she said.

Work has already started on the new building, and should be completed some time in August. The store will be at sidewalk level, and ample parking space will be provided.

Another building permit issued recently was made out to Myron Root, 47 South Fir street, to repair the roof, floors and loading platforms at his fruit packing plant.
