Reliable sources, meanwhile, furnished new information concerning arrangements to contact the nine-year-old kidnap victim's captors last week for payment of the \$200,000 ransom which effected his release.

It was strongly indicated Mr. and Mrs. John P. Weyerhaeuser, Jr., wealthy parents of the boy, received but one written message from the kidnapers and that any further exchange was by telephone.

At the same time it was learned federal agents had been posted at the house all last week, where it would have been an easy matter to listen in on any calls to the Weyerhaeuser home.

Still Seek Karpis.

It was obvious that the department of Justice still sought the notorious Karpis, only member of the Barker-Karpis mob now at large, but it was held likely, in view of developments that he was wanted for participation in the Bremer case.

The clamp of silence still was imposed today on the Weyerhaeuser family and it was impossible to learn what part they might be taking in efforts to capture the abductors of their son, held prisoner nearly eight days.
