

NO RELIEF WORK ON PROGRAM OF FOREST SERVICE

Telegraphic information has been received by the Rogue River national forest to the effect that the relief program for the forest service planned under the so-called four billion dollar act is cancelled.

This means that as far as the forest service is concerned there will not be a contribution toward relief work in the states of Oregon and Washington. As regards relief work for other states, no information is available at the local office.

Considerable information has been given out as regards the possibility of an expanded program on the Rogue River national forest this summer. This information was based on instructions from the Washington office to prepare for an enlarged program of work.

Much of the work planned under the relief program will be transferred to CCC camps and the whole program will eventually be carried out during the course of the next few years. The preparation program, therefore, is not wasted, local forest service officials say.

ART EXHIBITION WINS PRAISE OF FIRST VISITORS

do justice to a city of a hundred thousand. Jack Mallock and the others who have worked to make it possible deserve the appreciation of every art lover.

Although a few professional artists have hung paintings in the exhibit, most of the pieces were entered by amateur and student artists who have had no previous opportunity to exhibit their work.

One of the most interesting groups of paintings is that of Howard Rock, full-blooded Eskime artist of Point Hope, near Point Barrow, Alaska. Rock is the only Eskimo painter in the United States, and although he has been studying for less than two years, his work already shows outstanding promise.

Rock finds life here quite different from his early life inside the Arctic circle, where his Eskimo parents live by hunting whales seals and other animals.

Lanson Howard Crawford former CCC artist now with the Crater Lake national park as a ranger naturalist, has entered four water colors that are quite different from those displayed here last autumn. Crawford has chosen winter scenes and has obtained a remarkable effect with cold colors, whereas his last exhibit employed vibrant and daring colors.

Johnnie King, Medford commercial artist and one of the exhibit's sponsors, has entered several interesting pieces. Margaret Mortensen has entered several striking water-colors. Soap carvings by Prentice Petty are proving of interest to the visitors.
