



### BAHRAM, FAVORITE, IS DERBY WINNER, GOODFELLOW 2ND

#### Indian Potentate's Pony Chalks Up Sixth Straight Victory Since Starting to Race As Two-Year-Old

EPSON DOWNS, Eng. June 5.—(AP)—Bahrani, the favorite from the Aga Khan's stable, today won the 16th running of the derby. Robin Goodfellow was second and Field Trial third in the field of 16. Bahrani was clocked in two minutes and 36 seconds, two seconds slower than the track record set by Hyperion in 1933 and equaled last year by Windsor Lad.

In winning, Bahrani chalked up his sixth straight victory since he started racing as a two-year-old. He also became the eighth horse to win two of the three classics—having previously won the two thousand guineas at Newmarket.

Freddy Fox Up Ridden by Freddy Fox, the son of Blandford easily upheld the confidence of the public, which at one time made him the odds-on-chance. The surprise of the race, however, was Robin Goodfellow. Prior to the derby his best performance had been a second in the Greenham plate at Newbury two months ago, when he was beaten by Theft. Robin Goodfellow's rider, Tommy Weston, was up on Saratoga, when the latter won the 1934 renewal.

One of the strongest favorites in recent years, Bahrani went to the post the choice at 5 to 4, as the king and queen and a half million of their subjects viewed the race. Robin Goodfellow, a 50 to 1 shot, was two lengths back, with Field Trial another half length to the rear.

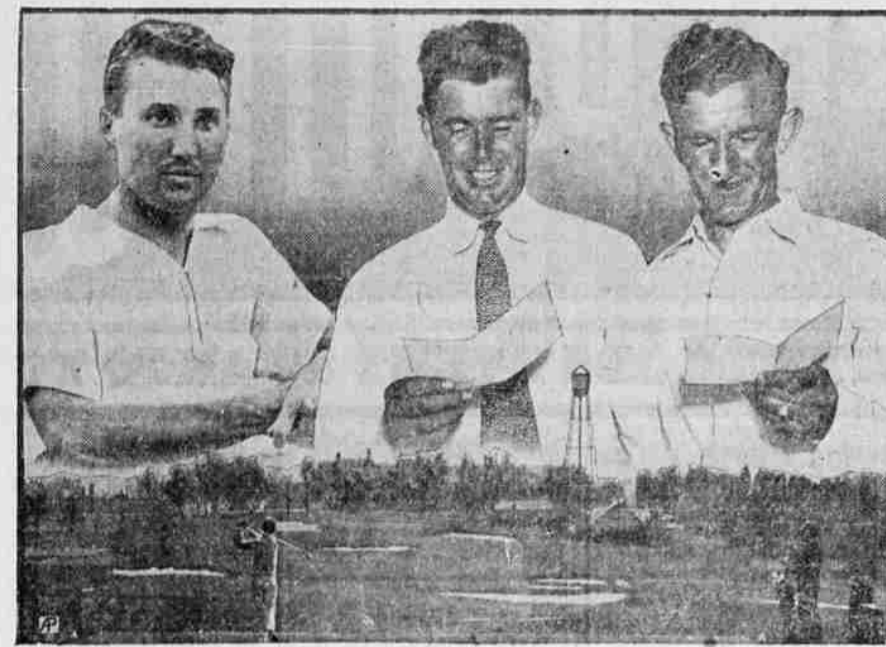
Astor Entry Third Robin Goodfellow carried the silks of Sir Abe Bailey while Field Trial ran in the colors of Lord Astor, who scratched his other horse, Plymouth Sound, early in the day. The latter was well played at 7 to 1. The Aga Khan's Theft was fourth while his other entry, Hairan, finished far back.

Lord Derby's Fairhaven was the fifth to cross the line followed by Sea Bequest from C. W. Gordon's stable. Mrs. Corlette Clornay's Assignment, the only American owned horse in the race was far back.

The victory was the second derby triumph for the Indian potentate, his Blenheim having won the classic in 1930.

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—Three young professionals who have been threatening for a couple of seasons to do something about serving youth with a national golf title of some sort will supply much of the dark-horse element when 182 of the nation's best attack Oakland's long and bunker-strewn layout in the National open June 5-8.

Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., Johnny Revolta of Milwaukee and Ky Laffoon, the Denver simoon—three of the most active performers of the last winter campaign—are expected to offer plenty of opposition to the older heads as represented by the defending champion, Olin Dutra, the ever-

threatening Gene Sarazen, F. G. A. Champion Paul Runyan and Craig Wood, who seems overdue for a break after his heart-breaking loss to Sarazen in the Augusta National this spring.

The tall and willowy Picard, this year's Azua Caliente open winner, leading shot-maker and money-winner of the winter circuit, turned up for the National by capturing the Metropolitan open with a brilliant 284, conquering, among others, Runyan.

The long-jawed Revolta, who bow Sarazen in the 1933 Miami open less than six months after Sarazen had declared Johnny didn't have the rhythm necessary to become a champion, is threatening again after a fine winter season in which he ranked third behind Picard and Runyan, averaging 72.1 strokes per round for 46 18-hole rounds. His biggest win last year was in the St. Paul open, when he beat Laffoon and Harry Cooper after a three-way tie. He lost to Vic Gheml in a playoff for the Los Angeles open last winter.

Laffoon won the Phoenix open early this spring, and last year triumphed at Glens Falls, N. Y., besides getting in on the three-way deadlock at St. Paul.

Revolta and Picard paired last March at Miami to win the International four-ball title from Runyan and Horton Smith.

With three bouts scheduled instead of two, there will be a slight advance in admission prices.

Despite the injury, it is said that the mystery man is more aggressive than ever and, with a dour outlook upon the world in general, gouges eyes and does other unorthodox things to his opponents more rigorously than before. Word received today from the meane indicates that he considers his bout with Joe Hubka a snap, and is confident of overcoming the Cornhusker's "iron" legs and whirlwind speed with rough treatment.

LONDON, June 5.—(AP)—Sir Malcolm Campbell, British sportsman, will attempt to better his own world's automobile speed record at Salt Lake City in July, he announced today.

Speaking before an advertising club luncheon gathering, Campbell said he would leave for Utah in July for a new record attempt that month. He lifted the record of 276.816 miles per hour at Daytona Beach March 7.

"It's impossible to rely on the future on the beach if you wish to do anything in the region of 300 miles an hour," the sportsman said. "You must have 100 per cent perfect conditions for high speed. We now are carrying out further tests for our attempt in July."

### 14 AMERICANS WIN IMPRESSIVE SUMS IN IRISH SWEEPS

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, June 5.—(AP)—Fourteen American fortunes in the Irish Free State hospital sweepstakes worth a total of 300,000 pounds—nearly \$1,500,000—rode with Bahrani, Robin Goodfellow, and Field Trial, the horse that came in first, second and third in the English derby today.

Americans held seven winning tickets on Bahrani, four on Robin Goodfellow, and three on Field Trial. The tickets were issued to: "Past Due," Brooklyn, N. Y., F. C. Prall, Buffalo, N. Y., T. O'Berle, New York City, Miss Hocken and three others, Oakland, Pa., Joseph Tymos, Allston, Mass., "Jack and Sonda Brody," Dorchester, Mass., A. T. Triehaway, and L. Hanser, Wilkesbarre, Pa.

Each of these tickets pays \$148,500. The total amount which comes to the United States from Dublin for the ticket holders on Bahrani thus is about \$1,031,500.

Four American tickets were held on Robin Goodfellow, the horse that came in second, and each pays its owner \$78,250—a total of \$313,000. The Robin Goodfellow ticket holders are: Lucky Sophie, Brooklyn, N. Y., Jus' Another Chance, Brooklyn, N. Y., J. A. Pasack, New York, Frank Maguire, Brooklyn, Americans won three tickets on Field Trial, the horse which came in third. Each of these tickets pays \$49,470, or a total of \$148,410. The ticket holders on Field Trial are: "B Hard Nuts," Haverford, Pa., Wm. J. Gunnis, New York, "Foursome," New York.

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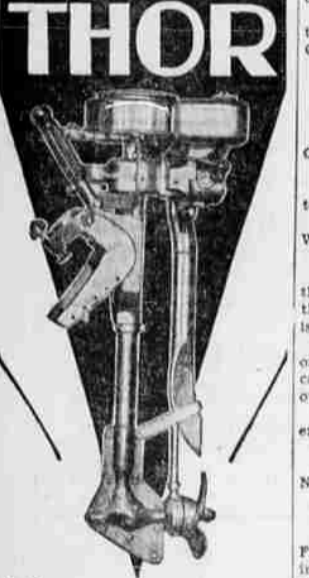
