GEN. VON LINSINGEN OF WORLD WAR FAME DIES

HANOVER, Germany, June 6.—(AP)—General Alexander von Linsingen, commander of Germany's southern army during the world war and of the Berlin garrisons when the imperialistic regime was overthrown in 1918, died today of bronchitis. He was 65 years old.

SLOW PROGRESS IN PASS CLEARANCE

BEND, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Grinding its way slowly through the heaviest central Oregon drifts on record, the state highway commission's snow plow today was believed to be about half way to the summit of the McKenzie Pass. Drifts range up to 40 feet in depth and considerable dynamite is being used to make operation of the plow possible.
