

BRITAIN SEEKING DUST HOLLYWOOD FROM FILM LEAD

Prospects of Titanic Battle Seen—Three Great Mer- gers Recently — Amri- cans Plan Heavy Spending

LONDON (AP)—For more than 10 years Britain's film chiefs have lived under the dictatorship of Hollywood. Now they are out to seize the leadership—at least in their home market—and prospects are it is going to be quite a battle.

Three great mergers have been put through within six months, and there are rumors of more to come. British producers are forming strong Hollywood alliances, and have \$35,000,000 in cash to throw into their productions this summer.

American companies are expected to spend another \$5,000,000 here. Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer is said to be planning to send over Norma Shearer, Robert Montgomery, Franchot Tone and possibly Jean Harlow and Joan Crawford this summer to form a complete production unit to make British pictures.

Yankee Profits in England

The acute interest in the great British market is said to be the result of the fact that one of the biggest American companies made the whole of its profit last year from British rentals.

England is, perhaps, more "movie conscious" right now than the average American community. It's virtually impossible to find a decent seat after 7 p. m. in any of London's first-run houses, and almost any cinema outside the main belt has a line waiting patiently before the box office every night.

In an effort to corral this market, Gaumont-British, with George Arliss, Jessie Matthews, Walter Huston and Conrad Veidt under its starring banner, plans to spend \$7,300,000 this summer, an average of \$250,000 a film.

British International at Elstree, with Richard Tauber, Lillian Harvey, Buddy Rogers, Gitta Alpar and Gretta Nissen already under contract and several outstanding players promised from Hollywood, expects to spend \$4,800,000 on 30 pictures.

Super Films in Making

Twelve of them will be "supers," costing more than \$250,000 each, and intended for the international market.

Between them, Gaumont-British and British International control 900 picture houses in England and are accumulating more by the minute.

London Films, the outfit that first put British pictures on the American map with "The Private Life of Henry VIII," has \$2,500,000 to spend on six or seven big films, starring Charles Laughton, Olive Brook, Maurice Chevalier, Leslie Howard, Merle Oberon and others. Alexander Korda, the producer, doesn't fool with the small "program" pictures.

Other productions in the field are Associated Talking Pictures, with a budget of about \$1,750,000, and British and Dominion with \$2,000,000 to spend on six or eight films. Both employ British stars almost exclusively. Associated Talking Pictures is paying Gracie Fields the record salary of \$750,000 a year.

Schenck Gets English Miles

Incidentally, there is nothing "fishy" about the large bond issues tossed around in the preceding paragraphs. Every company mentioned has been piling up big surpluses annually for three or four years and now has some really important money to spend.

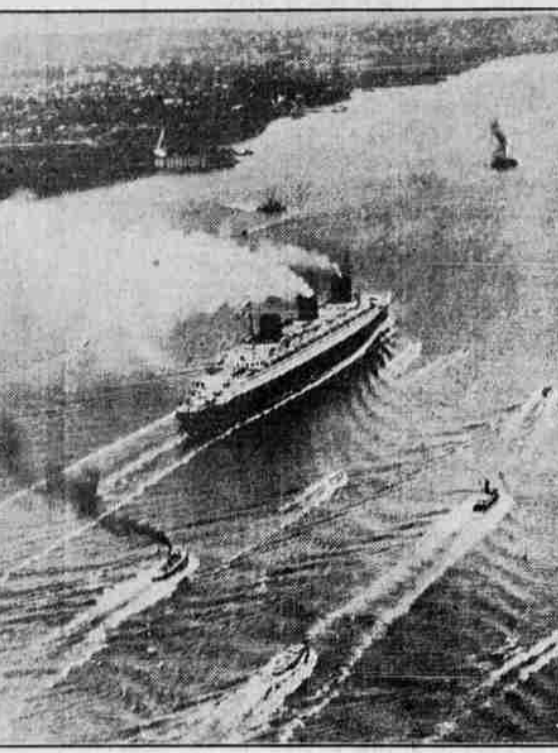
Realizing, evidently, that his British rivals were preparing for a serious challenge, Joseph Schenck, United Artist chief, has put in much time in England within the last year, attempting to build up his fences.

His reported plan is to form an alliance with the British exhibitor combine of Oscar Deutsch and J. C. Doneda, controlling around 200 houses, to assure himself a market for his films.

STATE ATTEMPTS TO BLAST SALLEE ALIBI TESTIMONY

her daughter about the veracity of the defendant, and "I did say Melvin lied."

Mrs. Herschel Gay, a neighbor, testified that Saltee told her "about 3:45 in the evening of April 16 last, the day of the crime, Melvin told me 'I worked hard today,' while purchasing a dozen eggs. Mrs. Gay also testified there had been no work performed on the road, which she traveled over after Saltee claimed he had repaired it.

C. H. Brown, testified that the Jackson County bank building clock was "very unreliable," and that "it is my impression it has not run for two months." Saltee testified that he looked at the clock on the afternoon of April 16, the date of the crime charged, "and it was three minutes to three." State witnesses testified that this was approximately the time the little girl was lured into an auto near the Central Point school.

It is anticipated that the closing arguments in the case, which has lasted four days, would be started this afternoon and that the case would be in the hands of the jury late today.

Most of the testimony Wednesday afternoon was devoted to testimony on measurements of the front yard of Mrs. Viola Anders in Central Point, and measurements of the Saltee coupe. Mrs. Anders testified that she saw the little girl enter the auto, when she left school, and "took down the license number." The defense attempted to refute Mrs. Anders' testimony by showing it was not possible to see the auto from her kitchen window, as she claimed. The state introduced photos to show that it was.

Joe Metternich, service station operator on the Crater Lake highway, testified that Saltee was in his place, "between four and six o'clock," on the day of the crime, and sales slips were introduced showing that the defendant had purchased supplies that day. The witness said he could not remember the exact time. Under cross-examination he recalled a conversation with Mrs. Saltee, but was unable to remember details.

MANY CANDIDATES TALKED FOR G. O. P. WHITE HOUSE RACE

Missouri Friends of Roscoe Patterson Making Quiet Campaign — Dr. Glenn Frank Is Also Prominent

Many random bits of news and speculation about 1936 and even 1940 drift into Washington on every breeze.

Very quietly, Missouri friends of Roscoe C. Patterson are making a campaign for his nomination for president by the Republicans next year. Some claim he already is assured votes enough to make him a real factor in the convention.

Patterson was defeated for re-election to the senate in 1934. He has a long record of party service, but there has been no widespread public mention of him for the presidency. What has been done in that direction represents one of the most noiseless delegate hunts ever conducted.

In various quarters there is talk of Dr. Glenn Frank, president of the University of Wisconsin, for Republican 1936 standard-bearer. He seems to have no organization as yet.

He is put forward as a liberal (but less liberal than the La Follette) who has a flair for phrasing, an exceptional ability as a speaker, and a considerable knowledge of political affairs, but no record of partisanship to handicap him.

Hoover Possibilities

One astute Republican old-timer thinks that if the convention were held tomorrow, on the basis of pledges and near-pledges already given more than a year in advance, more than 20 candidates would be assured of greater or lesser blocks of votes.

In various well-informed quarters there is a definite belief that the nominee is most likely to come from the Midwest or West. In spite of all the talk, friends of Herbert Hoover who should know do not expect him to throw his support to Orden Miller or any other easterner.

Hoover Given Pledges

Incidentally, various local leaders in several states are pledging their efforts to Mr. Hoover himself. He scarcely is likely to disavow this following at the present stage. What he does eventually is another matter.

To those on the inside of Republican affairs it would cause no surprise if the former president threw his support definitely to one of the leading candidates at the psychological moment, some months hence.

A good many candidates—particularly a half-dozen or more midwesterners—will be fishing secretly for that support. It should be remembered that those who control the party machinery in many sections, and especially in the south, are men picked by Hoover.

Some figure he might be able to control and deliver, beyond question, a good many scores of delegates.

afternoon, was to accept without change the first section of the senate resolution extending the NRA organization until April 1, 1936.

The rest of the senate resolution would be eliminated because the supreme court already has overruled the government's power to control interstate business and fix prices and codes.

Code Power Curbed

Added, however, would be a separate section specifically declaring that so much of the original recovery act as gave the president power to prescribe and enforce codes "is hereby repealed."

The opinion was expressed by some committeemen that with this language it would be unnecessary to add permission for industries to agree to voluntary codes.

Industries, they said privately, could agree to voluntary codes which could be submitted informally to the president. There would remain, however, no way of enforcing these voluntary codes.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—President Roosevelt will leave late tomorrow night to spend a week-end

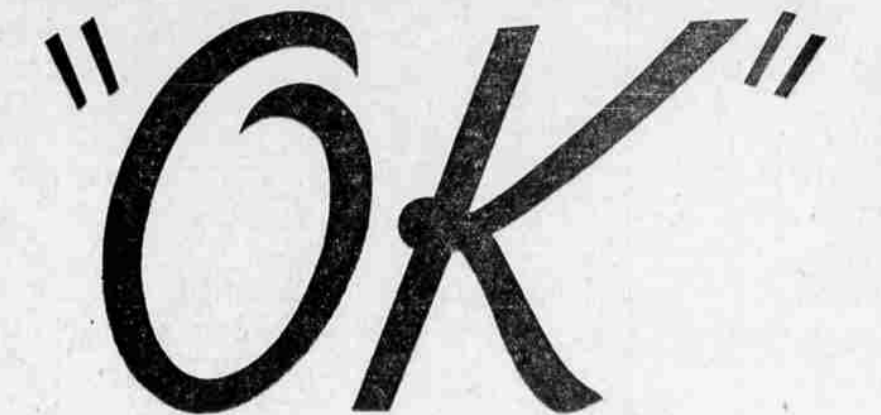
at his home in Hyde Park, New York, from where he will go to West Point next Wednesday to deliver diplomas to the graduating class of the military academy.
