A WASHINGTON dispatch tells us: "Legislative action to retain the NRA machinery but without any attempt to enforce the codes ruled out by the supreme court was decided upon today by President Roosevelt and congressional leaders."

In other words, KEEP THE JOBS. That is the essence of good politics.

GENERAL HUGH JOHNSON, speaking at a press club luncheon in Washington, asserts that no constitutional amendment is necessary to protect NRA principles.

The idealistic background of NRA, which is FINE, does not differ fundamentally in any way from the Golden Rule, which has never been written into any constitution or into any book of laws, but which has been of inestimable benefit to the world.

YOU must have glanced, at least hastily, at this dispatch from Quetta, India:

"Official quarters estimated tonight that 56,000 persons throughout this region lost their lives in the earthquake of last Friday."

That is practically equivalent to the population of any TWO counties in Southern Oregon.

This Quetta earthquake was a real disaster.
