agents working to solve the \$200,000 abduction. He would not say what his duties would be nor how long he expected to be here, but arrangements to provide him office space were made today at downtown headquarters of the justice department.

**Not a Hero**  
"I'm no hero," was Nathan's reply to newspaper men who sought information concerning previous cases on which he had worked.

Detectives Schrum and Browne, who took Kelly into custody in Portland, said he "got a big laugh when told federal men were after him."

"We know Kelly is broke," they said. "Why yesterday he hummed one of his friends for 15 cents for hamburger and coffee."

Kelly's police record showed he had been arrested mostly for drunkenness and disorderly conduct and that he was in the Portland city jail until five days before the kidnaping May 24.

Captain John J. Keegan of the Portland detective bureau, who has named six men he said federal agents wanted for questioning in the kidnaping, commented bluntly on Kelly by saying:

"They wanted him and they've got him." Kelly was not among the six Keegan previously named.

**12 Families Guarded**  
From a Seattle detective agency came information that federal agents had warned Puget Sound families of kidnapings, that 12 families had been guarded, and that four more sought protection the day George was snatched.

The families were not named and federal agents refused to comment on the reports.

From San Francisco and Sandpoint, Idaho, meanwhile, came reports that three of the other men named by Captain Keegan had been seen there recently.

Police Inspector Fred Butz said at San Francisco that J. R. McKee told him he had seen Jack Bailey and Harold McAttee there recently.

Bailey formerly was a bootlegger, known both in Portland and here, and McAttee is wanted for questioning in a St. Louis, Mo., slaying.

Sheriff Warren D. Rapp of Sandpoint, Idaho, said he was told by a prisoner that Bailey and Herbert Lester Johnston, another of the men named by Keegan, had been seen between Spokane and Missoula, Mont., last Monday.

# SALLEE CONVICTED MOLESTING CHILD IN QUICK VERDICT

Sallee was charged with a similar offense in Lane county last fall. Trial of the case resulted in a disagreement by the jury. Sallee, on the stand, admitted conviction of a felony in Idaho.

Sallee has been a resident of this county since last December 6, residing on Yankee creek in the Antelope district. He has been employed on SERA work. Previous to last December, Sallee testified, he had been a resident of this city and county "off and on for ten years."

Instructions to the jury were given this morning by Judge H. D. Norton. The trial started last Monday morning before a jury composed entirely of men. The case has attracted considerable interest, particularly in Central Point.

Yesterday was devoted to the final arguments of the state and defense, and rebuttal testimony by the state. Sallee offered an alibi defense, testimony being introduced in an effort to show that he was in this city at the time of the crime. The state offered positive identification of Sallee by the child and partial identification by adult witnesses.

The state was represented by Deputy District Attorney George W. Nelson and the defense by Attorney M. O. Wilkins.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—There was no change in butter or butterfat prices today.

Fully steady tone was continued in the market for eggs locally with prices unchanged generally. Receipts to date this season total 175,998 cases compared with 202,944 cases a year ago.

Cut of 1 cent a pound in the selling price on Tillamook cheese, a rare change, was announced. The new price on triplets at Tillamook was 16 cents a pound with 18 cents at Portland.
