



### DROLETTE OUSTED FROM LEADERSHIP LEAGUE BATSMEN

Clyde Carlstrom, Klamath Falls righthander, held Al Drolette to 1 hit in 6 trips to the plate last Sunday and as a result, the ancient Grants Pass catcher dropped from the Southern Oregon league batting leadership to make way for Roy Wheeler, Klamath shortstop, who collected 2 for 3, boosting his mark 38 points to 478 for the actual leader, Arnold Bauman, Ashland pitcher, is the nominal leader with a mark of 550.

Manager Paul Hoffard of the Medford Rogues holds down third place with a mark of 435.

Melvin McCarthy, Grants Pass shortstop, has crossed the plate 5 times to lead the league in runs scored with Tommy Martin, Klamath Falls centerfielder, in second place with 8.

Leading all pitchers is Clyde Carlstrom, Klamath Falls curve ball specialist. He has won 4 and lost 1 and also leads the strikeout department with 44.

### SPORT SLANTS

Jim Braddock must be conceded an outside chance, slim though it may be, of taking the heavyweight title from Max Baer when they meet on June 11.

It is surprising to note how many believe that Jim may spring a surprise if he follows his announced plan of taking the fight to Baer for three minutes of each round, with no time out for loafing or clowning.

Max likes to do his fighting by fits and starts, with a breathing spell following each flurry. Braddock feels sure that the best way to rob Max of his effectiveness is to crowd him and keep punching.

In all his fights Baer has shown a liking for plenty of elbow room, swinging his most damaging punches from long range. The blows which sent Schmeling and Carnera to the canvas were long, lightning swings, when the fighters were well apart.

Braddock plans to tie up the champion with short punches and at the same time stay inside his round-house swings. The trick is to make Max fight the way Jim wants him to. That's not going to be easy. Baer has a way, or did have, of setting the pace and making his opponents do as he wished.

**First Round Dangerous.**

If Braddock can weather Baer's two-lifted attack in the opening rounds and then keep pecking away in close he may rob the champion of some of his dynamite. Max was not in any too good shape when he won the title from Carnera. He just about wore himself out with that first flurry of punches. The fight never would have gone 11 rounds had Max been in any kind of shape.

Baer was not in favor of fighting Braddock from the start. It is one of those fights where the champion has everything to lose and practically nothing to gain. Most everyone thinks he should stop Braddock in short order and if he fails to do so his prestige will suffer plenty.

Max is on a spot of his own making and, judging from the apathy on the part of the boxing fans, can expect little in the way of remuneration for the risk he is taking.

Braddock's cause is not a hopeless one. Not while he is still on his feet and able to throw his right fist at Baer. Jim will be desperate to win and there is no telling how far the sort of courage that brought him back from discard to the position of challenger will carry him.

**Hard To Keep Down**

It is one thing to put Braddock on the floor and quite another to keep him there. In one of the bouts preliminary to the Carnera-Baer fight, Braddock picked himself off the floor, where Corp Griffin had spilled him, and knocked out the man who had floored him. That was the beginning of the trail which led him to the corner opposite Baer.

Braddock weighed over 200 pounds when he started training for the title bout. He has gradually whittled down his weight and hopes to enter the ring at 190. He'll be giving weight away to the champion but that's nothing new to Jim for he never has been much more than a light-heavyweight at most, but that hasn't stopped him from mingling with the big boys.

### GUARDSMEN SAVE HOODED GRAPPLER FROM ANGRY FANS

At least six persons in Medford the Masked Marvel thinks okeh are members of the national guard, who hastily threw up a line of defense along the edge of the Army mat last night and probably kept an angry mob from beating the mysterious man to a pulp after the hooded one had eye-gouged his way to an unpopular victory over Joe Hubka in the main event of the three-pley smear and snier program.

Tension was high when the Masked Marvel waded into Referee Ray Fribbie in the closing minutes, only to be floored by a right to the jaw, and when the marvel proceeded to beat popular Joe Hubka helpless to win the deciding fall, the crowd grabbed the much-disked hooded one by the heels and dragged him into range.

The fans, waiting for an opportunity to get their hands on him and lead by one furious green-shirted ringster who landed a series of rapid-fire punches on the Masked Marvel's nose, pummeled the hooded one into semi-unconsciousness before the national guardsmen, the sheriff and city police rallied to the rescue.

It was some time before the crowd subsided, but there was no further violence and the mystery man was escorted, bruised from head to foot, to the dressing room. Hubka was there ahead of him, mad clear through, and when the Cornhusker landed a challenge to a free-for-all, the Marvel picked up a chair and it took some more effort on the part of Uncle Sam to straighten them out.

From the first going the hooded man, whose 213 pounds outweighed the Cornhusker by five, used foul tactics. Hubka occasionally had the upper hand by virtue of his clever leg work and speedy technique, but dirty work inevitably won out.

The Marvel won the first fall in 14 minutes on pure and simple eye-gouging. It took Hubka only four minutes to gain the second tumble by twisting the Marvel's mask across his eyes, then using sonnenbergs and flying body sensors. In the final canno, which lasted six minutes, all three men in the ring were busy with feet and fists, the former football player from Nebraska landing the best wallop of the evening when after losing the fall, he floored the Marvel with a blow that laid him at the mercy of the crowd.

A Japanese chin lock that is more effective than it looks gave Tony Catalino, roughneck Italian, the first and third falls in the 45-minute semi-final over Johnny McWood, big ex-football star from D. C. L. A. McWood, 212, was unable to cope

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with Catalino's foul wrestling, but showed a burst of form in the middle tumble when he flattened the Italian toughly in two minutes with sonnenbergs. The first fall came in 13 and the final tumble was clocked by Johnny Millard, pinch hitting as timekeeper for "V" Beach, in nine minutes.

Floyd Wolfgang, 155-pound newcomer from Olympia, Wash., proved one of the fastest and cleverest middleweights ever seen here when he wrestled a draw in the 30-min. opener with Roland Warren, 152, Copco engineer from Klamath Falls.

Wolfgang, too clever for the engineer despite a 10 pound weight handicap, was responsible for the best-liked performance on the card.

The work was started Wednesday, which necessitated the grading of a new road into the property and other extensive changes.

As the opening day of the shoot, Thursday, June 13, approaches, the fine grounds of the local club are taking on a business-like appearance. Temporary buildings have been erected for the kitchen and lunch room and the soft drink and beer parlor has been completed.
