

# WALEY DISCLOSES HIDING PLACE OF 'HOT' BANK BILLS

George Weyerhaeuser, son of a wealthy Tacoma, Wash., lumber family. He had accounted for \$111,000 of the money. That would leave an additional \$5000.

The \$50,700 was found today buried in the historic immigration Pass, five miles south of Salt Lake City, Hoover said.

Identified by Boy. Hoover said the young kidnap victim positively had identified the Waleys and the fugitive Mahan.

Charging violation of the federal extortion statute, he indicated the state of Washington, whose laws provide a possible death penalty, would prosecute the kidnapers upon their return there.

Asked if additional complaints had been filed at Tacoma against other persons, Hoover said: "I don't know about that." He said that decision on the prosecution rested with the United States district attorney at Tacoma.

He reported the Waleys were "still in custody of our men at Salt Lake City."

Location of the \$50,700 resulted from constant grilling of Waley at Salt Lake City, the director said. The money was buried about two feet under the ground "in a black oil cloth and wrapped in a gunny sack."

The possibility that the fugitive Mahan "had short-changed his partner in crime, Waley," was advanced by Hoover. He said that apparently Waley received only \$95,000 of the \$200,000 ransom.

# CALIFORNIA PEAR PROSPECTS HIT BY PESTS AND RAINS

forms, which generally produces more than two-fifths of the total crop.

The report said the California pear crop, which usually represents more than one-third of the total pear production, suffered severe losses from scab infestation and a heavy fruit drop caused primarily by the heavy spring rains. Orchards were said to have been too wet during May to permit the operation of spray-machines, and the result would be scabby and mis-shapen fruit.

Good prospects were reported for the Washington and Oregon pear crop. The apple prospects in the Hood River and Willamette valleys in Oregon were reported as "spotted" due to many trees that bear alternate years. In Washington, the report said, there was little commercial loss from late frosts and good crop prospects are reported from the Wenatchee, Okanogan and Yakima districts.

# POOR QUALITY BUTTER CAUSES PRIME FIRMS TO RECEDE HALF CENT

PORTLAND, June 11.—(AP)—Cut of 1/2 cent in the price on prime first butter during the late season of the produce exchange indicated a lack of quality among considerable of the current supply, especially some from distant points.

Trade in butter was considered about steady for good quality and with the exception of prime first, was at unchanged price list. There was likewise no change in the price on butterfat, which has held well at undisturbed prices for an extended period.

Great demand for ice cream was relieving the butter market of quite a supply. Market for eggs was again generally without change for the day. Values were practically unchanged as all leading points. Receipts were again showing increase.

Prices were strong throughout the chicken market. One large operator was out with a special buying price of 15 1/2 lb. for broilers to be delivered on Friday.

Market for tomatoes was firm with an active movement of both California and local hothouse. Sales were being made up to 15c lb. for extra fancy hothouse in a small way with fancy up to 15c lb.

# DOOM OF LUMBER SHIP PILED ON COAST REEF IS SEEN BY MARINERS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—(AP)—Caught fast on a rocky reef 100 miles north of here, the lumber schooner Noyo was battered by heavy seas today after the crew of 28 and two passengers, a man and his wife, were rescued by coast guards.

None of those taken from the ship, which went aground early yesterday while noting through a thick fog, was injured. The passengers were Russel McCoy of Hemet, Calif., general manager of the Dill Lumber company, and his wife.

# Efforts to pull the 835-ton ship from the reef were launched by the National Steamship company of San Francisco, the owner, but mariners here said they feared it would be pounded to pieces by the heavy surf.

# KIDNAP RESULT OF PAROLE LOOPHOLE

SEATTLE, June 11.—(AP)—Harmon M. Waley, confessed participant in the Weyerhaeuser kidnaping, would still be in the Washington state penitentiary at Walla Walla today had the new state parole law, effective tomorrow, been on the statute books several years ago.

Three and a half years ago, police pointed out here, he was sentenced to the state penitentiary for term two to five years for burglary, and was paroled at the end of his minimum term. Under the new law there is no minimum until the parole board fixes one and where the convict has used weapons of any kind, the minimum is five years.

If he has a prior conviction, the minimum is seven and a half years, and such would have been Waley's case, as he had served a sentence in the Idaho state penitentiary.
