

### NAZARENE CHURCH GOSPEL CAMPAIGN GETS UNDER WAY

The gospel campaign opened under the big white tent opposite the Junior high school Sunday, receiving a commendable hearing under the ministry of Dr. C. H. Babcock, and Mrs. Mrs. Vernon Caywood, as music directors.

Speaking on "The Call of the Church," Dr. Babcock used as his scripture lesson the first eight verses of I. Cor., chapter 1, and drew his text in the second verse. His message in gist follows:

"The spirit of the Lord was given for the purpose of correcting man's moral and spiritual life. The church is the institution of God, as the promoting agency in carrying forward this program for correction."

"The actual church of Jesus Christ is a living, throbbing organism, as well as an organization, and you can no more kill this vine of God's planting than you can kill the power of Christ. As the sun climbs over the eastern hills, and fills the valleys with its glory, so God fills the church with the glory of His majesty and power."

"Man is wonderfully and immortally made. There is not gold enough nor silver or precious stones enough to buy the value of His worth. But Jesus Christ is the only answer to the bosom cry of man in weaving anew his broken spiritual fibre. Jesus Christ is that something new for which man must look today to re-fashion society and mold again the stability of economic surety. The basic principle of righteousness is the stamp of economic success. To start at the bottom of our trouble, first of all, man must be taken apart and put up right."

"The church of God is wonderful in its revival power, yet we have well nigh become paganized in the land of Christian birth. We nearly suffered the loss of our liberty through the innovation of the alphabetic governmental rule, but thanks to God for the supreme court."

"The Holy Ghost is the agency by which the church pulls aside the draperies of man's darkened spirit and brings to his door the awakening light of God. Horrific sadness awaits the non-conformity of man to the redemptive plan of God."

"Christ only is man's hope and stay when the dip of night breaks in upon his earthly pilgrimage. The glory of Christ enthroned within can never be dimmed by the shades of eternal night."

There were 15 angels responding to the call of the evangelist during the services of the day. The speaker and singers will be heard every morning at 10, and 7:45 at night, throughout the week, excepting Saturday.

### NEWLYWED BLUE JAYS GIVE NATURE STUDENT MATTER FOR THOUGHT

SARDINE CREEK.—(Sp.)—A study of nature at close hand often brings up the question as to whether things are regulated any more sensibly in the animal kingdom, which acts on instinct, than in the human kingdom, which is supposed to act on reason.

Consider the two blue-jays which this spring made their home at the edge of the old Dow property here. To begin with, they must have been newlyweds, for they built their nest less than six feet from the ground in a small fir tree sparse with foliage. Thus the nest was plainly visible and within easy reach of inquisitive humans, to say nothing of predatory animals.

In the second place, they very carefully built the nest on an angle and it tipped more and more with the weight of Mother Jay during the hatching period, until all but one of the eggs rolled out and crashed on the ground.

Even then instinct did not come to the rescue. The nest remained on a sharp slant and finally when the remaining egg hatched the little bird fell out and it would have perished but for Mrs. John Litster, who resides close by. She discovered the little bird, as naked as a pine needle, with the assistance of Chief, her fox terrier, and Flash, a neighbor's pointer, whose suspicious actions around the tree aroused her curiosity.

Mrs. Litster straightened out the nest and put the baby bird back into it. All the while, Mother Jay looked on from a nearby tree with such misgivings that she emitted squawks that were more raucous than usual. When she found what had been done, however, she was highly pleased and now she permits her benefactor to inspect the nest daily without a sound of protest.

The baby bird is growing very nicely, thank you, and soon will be on the wing. Perhaps next spring its parents will have sense enough to build higher and more securely.
