



SUPER-MEANIES COME TO GRIPS THURSDAY NIGHT

Ultra-meanie matwork is scheduled at the Armory arena Thursday night when Masked Marvel, the hooded horror, mixes in the main event of a three-plate card with Tony Catalino of Italy.

Although the national guardsmen who last week probably prevented an angry mob from virtually tearing the hooded one limb from limb after he had man-mauled both Joe Hunka and Referee Ray Friebe are now encamped at Fort Lewis, the promoter has secured extra police protection this week and will also have a relief force on deck in case Friebe is waylaid by the belligerent henchmen.

As both Masked Marvel and Catalino are healthily hated by Medford wrestling fans, the bout will probably not be interrupted unless the grapplers attack the referee. One is just as unruly and mean as the other, so if they pound each other to a pulp it will probably meet with approval from the record crowd of spectators that is anticipated. Catalino is vowing vengeance for a defeat at the hands of the mystery man recently at Kingsman Falls, promising that if he cannot whip the disguised snar and sneer artist he will all but die in the attempt.

A bout of a different color is slated in the 45-minute semi-final when Johnnie McWood, handsome ex-footballer from U. C. L. A. tangles with Casey Kazanjian, whose clean, scientific matwork will be witnessed here for the first time.

McWood was defeated by Catalino at the Armory last week, but figures that he will be able to put on a bang-up exhibition against a clean wrestler. His defeat at the hands of Catalino was due to too much rough treatment, which the stocky southerner could not stomach.

Roy Clayton of Walla Walla is scheduled to meet Floyd Wolfgang, local speed merchant, in the 30-minute opener. Clayton comes to Medford for the first time with an excellent reputation, while Wolfgang impressed the fans with his first appearance here in a whirlwind tussle last week.

JOLLEY, ECKHARDT LEADING BATSMEN

LOS ANGELES, June 12.—(AP)—Big Smead Jolley of Hollywood and Oscar (The Ox) Eckhardt, Missoua outfielder, are engaged in a neck-and-neck race for the batting leadership of the Coast league, averages released today showed.

Including games to date, Jolley is smacking the ball for a mark of 408, with Eckhardt one point behind. Rosenberg of Sacramento, Hunt of Seattle, and English of Portland follow in that order, but Jolley and Eckhardt occupy the 400 circle to themselves.

Three teams are above the 300 in club batting, Hollywood topping the list with 307 and Los Angeles and Portland being tied for second place with 302.

Mickey O'Brien, 160-pounder of Oak Knoll, who knocked out Szczepanski of Oregon Caves in the second round of their special event three weeks ago, will be pitted against Ed Slattery of South Fork, who kayoed Wallis of Gasquet, also in the second round.

The two fighters are anxious to continue the Oak Knoll-South Fork feud which started when Rudy Lezar of South Fork knocked out De Shields of Oak Knoll in a spectacular main event several weeks ago. De Shields has challenged Lezar for another shot at the district's unofficial middleweight title and Lezar has agreed to meet the great colored scrapper.

De Shields was unable to appear on the last card because of a cut lip, but if the camp surgeon gives his approval, he will be here Friday evening with blood in his eyes and ready for battle. De Shields knocked out Glabb of Humburg in a spectacular main event several months ago, and has been a consistent winner until his match with Lezar. De Shields says he "stepped into one" that time, but will be loaded for Lezar Friday evening.

A big card is being planned by Captain William C. Ryan, district athletic officer. Fifty fighters will be brought in and examined and only those in the best physical condition will be given an opportunity to fight. This assures fast action during the three-round bout.

LONDON, June 12.—(AP)—Sweeping along toward her second successive tournament title, Helen Wills Moody today trounced Nancy Lyle of England in the third round of the Kent tennis championship today, 6-1, 6-2.

The Californian, attempting a comeback after being on the sidelines for nearly two years, played perhaps the best tennis she has flashed since she came to England a few weeks ago. Her British rival was outclassed throughout.

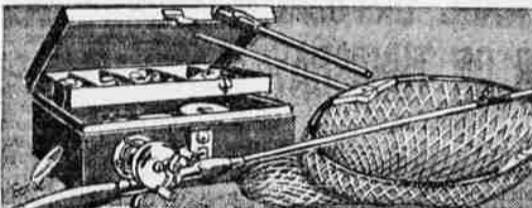
