ARRESTED PICKETS HELD IN ARMORY

PORTLAND, June 12.—(AP)—Governor Charles Martin again entered Oregon's strike picture today by authorizing the use of the Portland armory to house arrested pickets and declaring "all resources of the state" will be utilized in handling the situation. One hundred and sixty men had been arrested by Sheriff Martin T. Pratt and his deputies this afternoon, all of whom the district attorney has announced will be charged with disorderly conduct. Most of the men were arrested at the Bridal Veil mill on the Columbia river east of here. As fast as the deputies loaded the men into cars, new pickets were sent out from Portland by union officials who have announced test cases will be held.

FOUND MORE TOWNS IN BONNEVILLE AREA

BONNEVILLE, Ore., June 13.—(AP)—Two more towns, one in Oregon and one in Washington, had been incorporated today as a result of the influx of residents into this area for the construction of the \$32,000,000 Bonneville dam.
