



### MEAN GRAPPLERS HEADLINE CARD AT ARMORY TONIGHT

#### Masked Marvel and Catalino Expected to Stage Unorthodox Classic — Other Bouts Scientific

Knock-down, drag-out muscle-mangling to speedy, scientific wrestling is scheduled for the Armory arena tonight in a triple-deck array and a mer program headlining what promises to be a super-struggle between Masked Marvel, the mysterious mauler, and Tony Catalino of Italy.

Expecting the roughest fracas he has yet been responsible for, Promoter Lillard has secured extra police protection for the two main event contestants in case the anticipated record-breaking crowd decides to take matters into its own hands. A relief referee to pinch hit for Fireman Ray Frisbie has also been secured in case Frisbie is unable to take the maltreatment that he is sure to receive when the two ultra-muscles get together.

**Marvel Favored.**  
Some fans believe the Masked Marvel will whip the roughneck Italian easily, and others contend that when pitted against a man just as unscrupulous as himself, Catalino will dish out so much unorthodox matwork that he will have the bout in the bag. Masked Marvel won in a riotous match against the Italian recently at Klamath Falls, but both grapplers all but clawed each other into unconsciousness.

The big Italian bully, who specializes in a foolproof Japanese chinlock, is in a frenzy over his Klamath Falls defeat, and avows that when he meets the hooded one tonight it will be a bout of a different outcome.

**Others Have Science.**  
In contrast to the main event finale, the fans will probably see a fast session of clean grappling when Johnnie McWood, former football ace from U. C. L. A., meets Casey Kazanjan, ex-footballer from Stanford, in the 45-minute semi-final.

McWood lost his initial bout here last week when he was unable to cope with Catalino's rough stuff, but he figures that with a clean opponent such as the Stanfordite, he will be able to put on an exhibition of science that should be hard for any grappler to withstand.

Kazanjan comes to Medford for the first time heralded as one of the fastest heavyweights in the northwest, and in a long series of tussles in Portland he has never lifted a hand against an opponent in foul play.

The promoter announced today that some of the new talent that is expected to be unscarified in tonight's card may be used in a bout in the near future against Lee Wolf, scientific matman who may return to Medford soon.

**KLAMATH COMING TO SEEK REVENGE**  
Smarting under a beating administered last week by the Medford Rogues, the Klamath Red Sox bring ruffled feelings to this city Sunday, with the renewed intention of knocking the Rogues out of the box. This they managed to do once before, the score now being even between the two, with one win each.

### HOT COMPETITION IS PROMISED FOR SHOOTING HONORS

Frank Troeh, the veteran Portland trap shooter, will have to crack down on clay pigeons with marvellous accuracy if he is to retain the Oregon state championship at 16 yards. It is the belief of the managers of the tournament that opened today at the Medford Gun Club.

The meet has turned out to be one of the largest held in the United States in recent years and many of the best scrapper gunners of the state are competing. Expert shooters are here too from all the western states and British Columbia, but they will not be eligible for state titles. They will, however, give spice to the competition, for they shoot along with the native sons.

Among the noted gunners from neighboring states are George Young of Buckley, Washington, who holds the championship at 16 yards for his state; H. C. Griffin of Seattle; H. H. Rawson of Spokane and B. J. West of Seattle.

Carl Vining of Sacramento is another luminary who is competing in the Medford meet. Mr. Vining took for the championship of California last week, clipping 198 of the 200 targets offered him, and became runner-up when he lost in the shoot-off.

Mel Lefler of Stockton, Cal., also is listed among the contestants. He won the all-around championship of California last week and tied in the doubles event. He is a protégé of O. N. Ford who is known from coast to coast as the Grand Old Man of the game.

There may be surprises and upsets during the tournament, too. Consider the case of E. W. Atkinson of San Jose, Cal. Bated in the D division of trap artists, a shooter who only once before had broken 20 straight targets, Mr. Atkinson last week proceeded to win the California state handicap championship by breaking every one of the 100 clay discs tossed out to him from the traps.

Another Californian on hand is William J. Silva of Modesto who two years ago won the Pacific coast handicap.

Chester W. Wood of Los Banos, Cal., also is listed among the competitors in the Medford meet. Mr. Wood, now president of the California State Trapshooters association, is a former Medford resident and he once served as head of the Medford Gun Club.

Numerous other trap celebrities are here for the meet and some remarkably accurate shooting is anticipated by the tournament managers.

### JEFFRIES AND SHARKEY AGREE MAX BAER WILL PULVERIZE BRADDOCK

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13. — (AP) — Two old-time soldiers of the heavyweight boxing wars, James J. Jeffries and Tom Sharkey, who couldn't agree in the ring more than three decades ago, share the same belief today, mainly that Max Baer should pulverize James J. Braddock tonight in Madison Square Garden's Long Island bowl.

Jeffries, former king of the heavens, thinks Baer will win as he pleases. Baer, once a contender, still a mighty man at close to 60, doesn't concede Braddock a chance.

"Jeffries in his prime could have chased both of those youngsters out of the ring the same night," said "Sailor Tom." "If I was ten years younger I'd take on Braddock myself."

Art Laskey, Jewish heavyweight who lost to Braddock last April in the fight that earned the latter the right to meet Baer, views the bout differently. He thinks Braddock has "a good chance" to win. "Braddock can punch, and a puncher always has a chance," he observed.

### GUNNERS FLOCK IN FOR COMPETITION IN STATE CLASSIC

The list of entries in the Oregon State trap shoot was further augmented today as additional sportsmen arrived from western states, their guns meticulously oiled and carefully packed in dust-proof cases.

After scouring the grounds and equipment at the Medford Gun Club with experienced and critical eyes, they expressed complete satisfaction and congratulated T. E. Daniels, president of the local club, and his associates for their work in having the field in perfect condition.

It is seldom that the public has the opportunity to see so many top shooters in one meet, it was pointed out by club officials who again emphasized that spectators are welcome, there being no admission charge.

Among the new arrivals were Ernest Carsten of Camino, Cal., and his young son, Ernest, Jr., who competed in the junior skeets event. The Carstens came with Homer P. Brown, president of the Diamond Springs Lumber company of Diamond Springs, Cal., and Mr. Brown came to compete in the tournament through the urgent persuasion of Mayor George W. Porter, vice-president of the Medford Gun Club. Mayor Porter met Mr. Brown for the first time at a trap meet in Reno, Nev., last year and since then Mr. Brown has been a friend until Mr. Brown agreed to come to the Medford tournament.

Rather a large number of the veteran contestants brought their sons to the Medford meet, among them being Henry Rosenbrock of Gardnerville, Nev., whose 19-year-old son, Henry, Jr., won the sub-junior national championship in Ohio when he was 14 years old.

Dr. J. J. West of Seattle was also here today for the meet. Dr. West invariably shoots hip and tuck with his friend, George Young, Washington state champion, who also is entered in the tournament here.

Dr. West was one time mayor of Morton, Wash., and so many mayors and former mayors are here that Mayor Porter was thinking of calling a special session of city council executives. Besides Dr. West and Mayor Porter there is Dr. J. G. Cooke, mayor of Yreka, Cal., not to mention Charles Doerkendorfer, mayor of Stanwood, Wash., who has the complicated job of ushering the tournament.

By plane today came K. M. Leach of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, D. V. McQuay, crack shot of Victoria, British Columbia, H. W. Carpenter of Pullman, Wash., and H. Barr Carls of Salt Lake City, Utah.

George Cowan, an sports writer on the Portland Oregonian, is due to arrive tomorrow to report the tournament for his newspaper.

Joe Terry, California professional, was here today, along with a fellow professional, B. L. Deaton, manager of the National Lead company in Portland. C. G. Hillman arrived from Independence.

### BAER WILL KAYO BRADDOCK EARLY IS VIEW OF FANS

#### Challenger On Short End of 5-1 Odds in Tonight's Battle — Weather and Seat Sale Far From Bright

The heavyweight championship bout tonight between Baer and Braddock, slated for 15 rounds or less, will start at 8 p. m. (P. S. T.) and will be broadcast over NBC hookup.

NEW YORK, June 13. — (AP) James J. (Long Shot) Braddock will get the opportunity tonight to spring one of the greatest fluke upsets of all time when he battles the clotting Californian, Max Baer, for the heavyweight championship of the world.

The weather outlook was not much brighter, however, than the prospects for the gallant but lightly regarded challenger from New Jersey.

Odds 5 to 1  
Braddock was on the short end of 5-to-1 odds that seemed certain to lengthen by the time the class gather around the ringside and the weather man predicted "occasional showers" during the day. The title card will be postponed until Friday night if there is too much rain.

At least nine of every ten customers willing to pay from \$2 to \$20 for eyewitness privileges in Madison Square Garden's sprawling open-air arena on Long Island planned to cheer the underdog enthusiastically regardless of the prospect that they will see him soundly whipped.

They may rattle around the bowl a bit, these fans, for it seemed unlikely there would be more than 35,000 spectators in an arena built to handle more than twice that number, but they promised to give the challenger all the vocal encouragement possible.

Apparently nine out of every ten fight experts figure Braddock to have no more than an outside chance of escaping an early knockout.

All have conceded Jimmy's improvement, his courage under fire and the intensity of his preparation to achieve the fluke goal of a lifetime. Critics and fans alike have had their imagination captured by Braddock's uphill battle to achieve the heavyweight heights.

Perhaps it would be a miracle for Braddock to win, but it's been done by long-shots in every sport. Even Marko of War was beaten once. Sam Parks, a 60-to-1 shot, came through to capture the national open golf crown only last week.

Corbett Did It  
John L. Sullivan was a 4-to-1 favorite the day he lost the heavyweight championship to James J. Corbett. The fight world was shocked when Jack Dempsey, a 3-to-1 choice, was beaten for the first time by Gene Tunney.

Bear's next championship fight, if he wins, will be under the auspices of the Twentieth Century Sporting Club, the Garden's metropolitan rival.

### 'GRAND OLD MAN' OF TRAPSHOOTING HERE FOR EVENT

The Grand Old Man of trapshooting is here for the big state tournament being held at the Medford Gun Club.

If he can stand on his feet long enough, he says he is going to take away at least one trophy and if he can't get into the competition himself he is counting upon the large contingent of pigeon breakers he brought with him from California to annex enough prizes to warm the hearts of their associates back in the sunshine state who could not get away for the meet.

The Grand Old Man of trapshooting is O. N. Ford of Del Monte, Cal. Well advanced in years, he assured his numerous friends among the trap artists that his eyes are still keen and his trigger touch is still sensitive, but his legs recently went back on him and he now finds it difficult to stand for sustained periods.

Mr. Ford has competed in trap meets in every state in the union and in all parts of Canada. He has held all sorts of championships, and his home is laden with more than 600 trophies. He wears a beauty—a watch chain of gold nuggets with a jeweled medal at the end—that shows he has held the national title. He recalls that he competed in Medford 23 years ago and for five years managed the Portland Gun Club.

Mr. Ford said he has been shooting for 54 years, and that brought up the question of his age.

"I never tell my age," he said. "You may say, however, that 54 years ago I carried the news on horseback, too. I was first with the news all through Lynn county, Iowa. Maybe you can figure out my age by that. Anyhow, the boys call me the old man."
