

FINE SCORES MARK EARLY SHOOTING IN MAJOR EVENT

Results of the first few rounds of shooting indicated that competition during the entire meet will be exceedingly keen and it seemed certain that several remarkably high scores would be recorded.

Several of the leading exponents of the shotgun art broke 74 out of 75 targets in the first three rounds of shooting, among them being Henry Rosenbark, Jr., the 19-year-old youth of Galesville, Nev., who won the national sub-junior title when he was 14. Others losing but one target out of 75 included Mel Letter of Stockton, Cal., J. O. Coats of Pocatello, Idaho, Oscar Shiffrer of Timber and Frank Troch, Portland ace and holder of the Oregon state singles championship.

Among those shattering 73 out of the first 75 birds tossed out to them were Carl Vining of Sacramento, Cal., A. J. Roy of Portland, and J. A. Gallagher of Corvallis. Gunners losing only three targets in the first three rounds included Charles Leith of Portland and O. N. Ford of Del Monte, Cal., the grizzled veteran of 54 years of trap shooting who has competed in every state in the union and every province in Canada.

E. W. (Ted) Renfro, the international celebrity from Dell, Mont., lost four birds in the early shooting, but despite this early set-back the world's live bird champion of 1931 was by no means out of the running. Mr. Renfro was in excellent spirits and his gunning ability was commanding the respect of all his fellow sportsmen.

Weather conditions again were excellent when today's program opened. The sky was cloudy, with no glare to handicap the shooters, and only a slight breeze was noticeable.

Most of the trophies are now on display and their beauty and usefulness evoked much favorable discussion. In addition to the cups and articles numerous cash purses are being awarded.

FRANCE DEFAULTS BUT OFFERS HOPE

PARIS, June 14.—(AP)—France, in defaulting her war debt payment to the United States for the sixth time today, expressed hope "the situation in the near future would justify" negotiations for a settlement.

Premier Pierre Laval's note of default was approved by the councils of ministers today, after it had been cabled to the Washington embassy last night for delivery to the state department tomorrow.

The note thanked the United States for the "renewed suggestion in the American 'statement of account' that France submit a proposal for payment."

LASKA OVERRULED IN MOVEMENT FOR ACQUITTAL ORDER

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 14.—(AP)—Federal Judge Edgar S. Vaughn today overruled a motion of Ben B. Laska, Denver attorney, for a directed verdict of acquittal in his trial on charges of conspiracy in allegedly accepting part of the Charles F. Urschel kidnaping ransom for defense attorney fees.

Judge Vaughn granted a similar motion of James C. Mathers, youthful Oklahoma City attorney charged jointly with Laska, after Mathers had made a brief statement of denial from the witness stand.

In overruling Laska's motion, Judge Vaughn held there was sufficient evidence to permit the case to go to the jury.

The motions were made at the conclusion of rebuttal testimony. Final arguments began as Laska's motion was overruled.

Laska, attorney for Albert Bates, serving a life sentence for the kidnaping of Urschel, millionaire oil man, denied vigorously he had received any part of the ransom fund.

actment of the Guffey coal stabilization bill to create a "little NRA" for the soft coal industry.

"D. C. Kennedy and I agreed with the President that we would recommend to our respective interests the entire acceptance of the President's suggestions," Lewis said.

Kennedy, chairman of the Appalachian joint conference, immediately sent out a notice to operators to assemble here for a conference tomorrow at 10 a. m.

Lewis said he felt the Guffey bill had "ample support" in both houses of congress to insure enactment.

Lewis said that in view of the President's action, it was a "safe assumption" that the operators and miners would accept his and Kennedy's recommendation and vote to continue work under the present wage scale and working conditions through July 1.

NEW YORK, June 14.—(AP)—Retail business picked up sharply last week under the influence of warm weather, Dun & Bradstreet said today in their weekly summary of trade conditions.

Volume reached the best rate since the Easter shopping season at a number of centers, the review declared.

"Less resistance to current prices is evident," it continued, "and consumer buying has turned strong in practically all lines, especially in merchandise suitable for hot weather."

The greatest activity was in textiles with the emphasis on women's cotton dresses and suits of linen, rayon and silk. Although reports from all of the leading centers of distribution pointed out the expansion in consumer demand thus far in June from the unsatisfactory showing of May, the estimated gain in retail sales for the country as a whole was not more than 2 per cent to 3 per cent over the comparative totals of a year ago when the prevalence of summer temperature was general.
