VOTE JUNE 18 ON STOCK DISTRICT

SWEETHEART OF KIDNAP SUSPECT BELIEVED HELD

LOS ANGELES, June 14.—(UP)—Blond Peggy Shaw, 22-year-old Tacoma, Wash., housewife, paced a county jail cell today laughing off charges she was the sweetheart of William Mahan, suspected leader in the Weyerhaeuser kidnaping case. She was arrested at Newhall, Cal., on a stolen automobile charge, but said this accusation was "silly."

"I gave the policeman my pink slip when he arrested me," she said with a shrug, she passed off questions about the kidnaping. "All I know is what I read in the papers," she said, adding: "I knew I would be considered a good suspect."

Miss Shaw, also known as Peggy Radford, according to police, reportedly is a member of a prominent Tacoma family, she said she worked in a sanitarium until three weeks ago, accompanying patients on horse-back rides. She came to Hollywood last month, she said.

Miss Shaw was accompanied by Jack Woods, Glendale, Calif., oil salesman, when arrested. She said she had driven out in the country with Woods to dine. Woods was questioned and released.

She told reporters a motorcycle officer who had stopped her car said, "Well, I guess this is it, all right," and ordered them to get out. Asked what the policeman meant, he replied: "This car is on the sheet."

Capt. Morris G. Stensland, chief of county investigators, questioned Miss Shaw, and later said he "saw no reason to disbelieve her story that she knew nothing about the Weyerhaeuser case."

Miss Shaw waived extradition proceedings. Stensland notified Police Chief H. P. Bird of Washington City, Wash., that Miss Shaw was being held for Washington authorities.
