

KLAMATH PLAYER LEADING LEAGUE AS BAT SWINGER

Paul "Bernie" Bernadou, young Klamath Falls second baseman, spattered base hits all over Modoc field last Sunday to jump from eighth place into the Southern Oregon league batting leadership, displacing his teammate, Roy Wheeler, who dropped to fourth.

Bernadou had a perfect day at bat against Paul Haffard, Medford pitcher, smashing out a triple, two doubles and a pair of singles in five trips to the platter; boosting his average an even 100 points to the amazing mark of .500.

Manager Haffard of the Rogues holds down second place with an average of .444; Ashland's manager, Cliff McLean, is in third position with .438, while Al Drolette, Grants Pass catcher, leads his team with .400.

Although going runless last Sunday, Melvin McCarthy, Grants Pass third baseman, retains the lead in the run-getting department. He has crossed the plate nine times.

Medford leads in team batting with a combined mark of .301. Revised pitching percentages show Frankie Eastart, Grants Pass south-paw, leading with three wins and no losses, instead of three wins and one loss, as released last week.

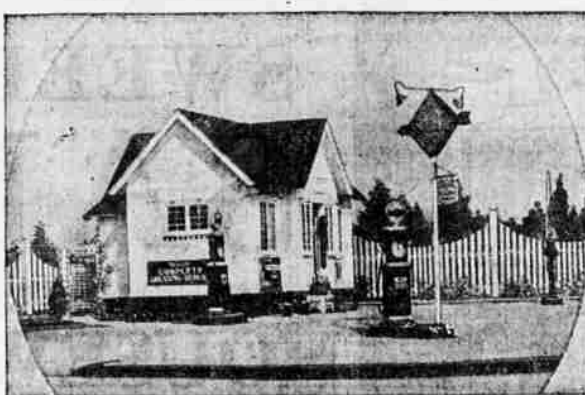

NEW 'SAFETY LANE' AT LEONARD STATION TESTS BRAKES FREE

The Chet Leonard Super-Service station No. 1 at Riverside and Jackson streets, has just completed the installation of a new Weaver Safety Lane automatic brake tester, one of the most modern and perhaps the fastest testing equipment yet invented.

It is simple to operate and requires less than one minute to test brakes, testing all four wheels at the same time. Merely drive on the tester and stop. Immediately the braking on energy is shown by the rise of a specially prepared liquid in the four separate gauges in the head of the tester. The new equipment was installed by D. W. Withnell of Springfield, Illinois, factory representative. He states that at recent tests held in Portland, over the Safety Lane, out of 460 cars tested, 281 showed mechanical defects and 180 of this number had defective brakes. QUEEN HELEN SUFFERS FIRST TENNIS SETBACK AT BRITISHER'S HANDS

LONDON, June 14.—(AP)—Helen Wills Moody suffered the first defeat of her tennis comeback campaign today, bowing to Katherine Stammers, third ranking British star, 6-0, 6-4, in the semi-final round of the Kent championships.

Facing the sternest test of a campaign that had brought her eight successive victories in England, Mrs. Moody found herself overmatched by Miss Stammers, left-handed holder of the British hard court championship. Miss Stammers used her backhand to make openings for winning drives and was helped no little by the fact that the Californian lacked her usual accuracy. Mrs. Moody overdrove the baseline by yards on several occasions.

Up until today, Mrs. Moody had dropped only one set since her arrival in England and apparently was playing as well as ever. But she simply could not get started against Miss Stammers and the British girl ran through the match with amazing ease.

WILL OFFER BRADDOCK SHOT AT SCHMELING

HAMBURG, Germany, June 14.—(AP)—Walter Rothenberg, German promoter, announced today he was completely revising his plans for a heavyweight match in Europe this summer between Max Baer and Max Schmeling, as a result of Baer's defeat by Jimmy Braddock.

The promoter plans to offer the new champion a chance to meet Schmeling in Baer's place, and if that fails, to make a drastic downward revision in the terms he has offered Baer for a European battle. The promoter said he had cabled Braddock an offer for a title match with Schmeling somewhere in Europe on August 17.

QUICK SPICE CAKE (2 adds)

2 cups sifted Swiss Doves Cake Flour
2 teaspoons Calumet Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 cup sugar
8 tablespoons softened butter or other shortening
1/2 cup molasses
2 eggs, well beaten
1/2 cup milk

Beat four: once, measure, add baking powder, salt, spices, and sugar, and sift together three times. Add butter and molasses. Combine eggs and milk; add to flour mixture, stirring until all flour is dampened; then beat vigorously 1 minute. Bake in two greased 8-inch layer pans in moderate oven (375° F.) 25 minutes, or until done. Spread coffee frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake.
