The good ship Transylvania under the British flag had been my home for several weeks. During this time numerous short stops on land had been made along the Mediterranean where were seen flag flying from many nations in effort to hide the tears. What strange spark was wafted from the folds of that flag to kindle our hearts? Was it not the same flag that those six hundred people had seen all their lives? To be sure it was, but flying there majestically alone, thousands of miles from home, it somehow brought to each one's mind our cruise director was explaining the flag and the beauty of his homeland, and a sense of protection that no other thing can give to an American. Before returning to Boston, I visited the battlefields of France and remembering the incident in Turkey, I could fully understand why our men were eager and anxious to follow that flag in 1917 and 1918, even unto death!"

Musical Travelogue at Baldwin's Shoppe Praised by Audience

Displaying initiative and a fine originality, Roberta Ward Bebb presented her piano students in an interesting and superlatively varied program Friday evening at Baldwin's Recital hall.

Mrs. Bebb's idea of a "Musical Travelogue" in costumes, provided an evening of artistic, educational and highly diversified entertainment.

The travelogue, written by Mrs. Bebb, covered the characteristics and history of the music of the various countries represented and was read explanatory of each piece.

Opening the program the diminutive fairy from the "Land of Illusion" waved her magic wand, as if to welcome the music of the many countries to follow. Then came the primitive music of the Indian of Holland, China, Russia, England, Scandinavia, Italy, Spain and Cuba.

Each pupil seemed to possess a keen sense of the character of his or her piece and played with authentic feeling.

The colorful costumes added an exotic note to the visual, as well as the musical aspects of the program.

Le Murie Beck, a former pupil of Mrs. Bebb, and who has just completed her freshman year at Mills College, majoring in voice, delighted the audience with her interpretation of her numbers. La Murie possesses an excellent soprano voice of fine range, perfect intonation and firm, warm tone. She sings with a technical certainty and clarity of diction that carries each word to the most distant listener. She was accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Bebb.

An interesting finale, a transcription of national airs, was played by Emmett Beeson, dressed in a Boy Scout's uniform.

Dorothy Gaddis, costumed as a Scotch "lassie" and Dorothy MacKenzie, as a Gypsy, acted as ushers. Mrs. Bebb was presented with two beautiful baskets of flowers by her pupils and friends.

A notable attribute of the evening was the applause by the audience, filling the house to capacity, thus showing their appreciation of one of the most novel and ambitious undertakings of its kind that has been presented in Medford.
