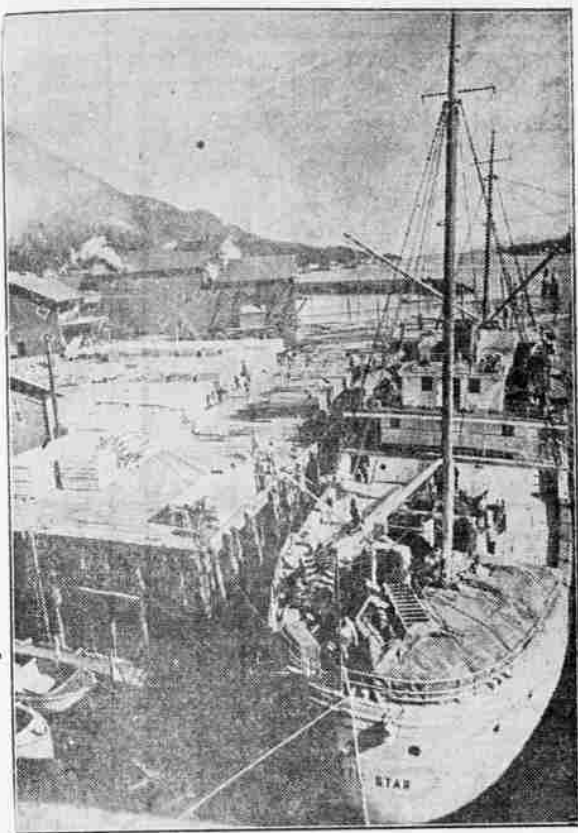
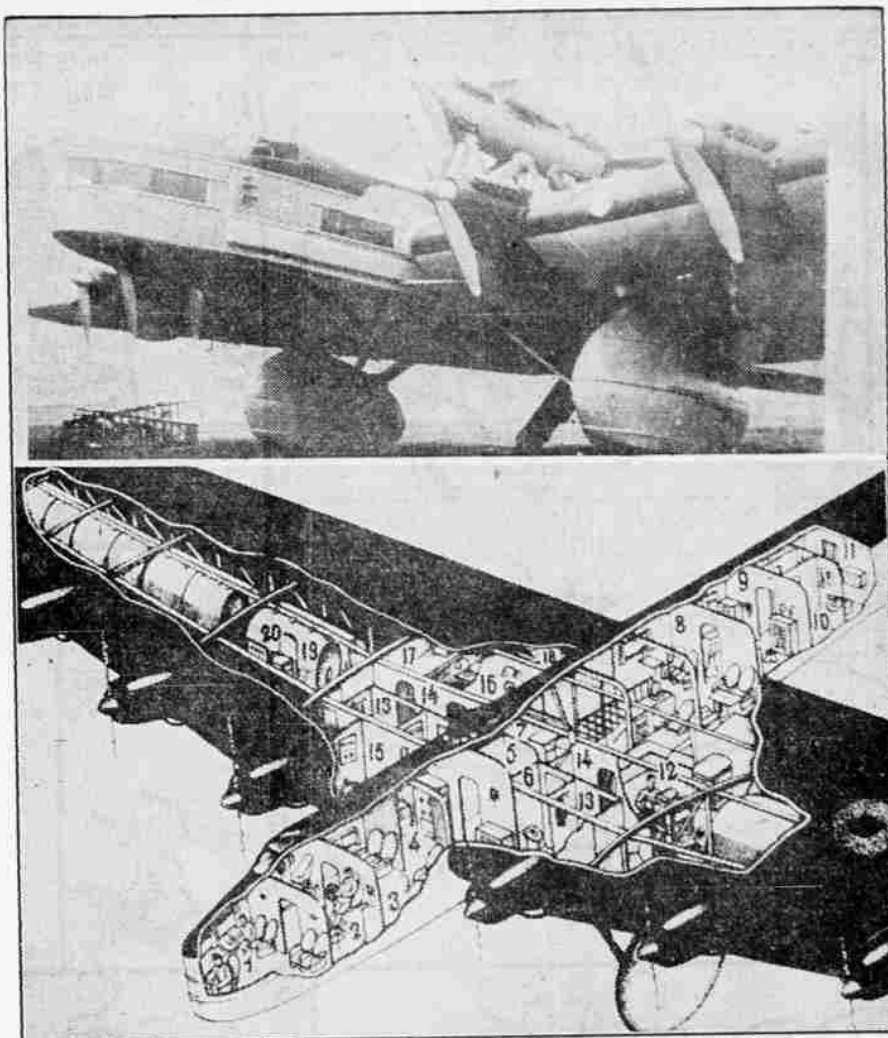


ALASKA LUMBER FOR MATANUSKA



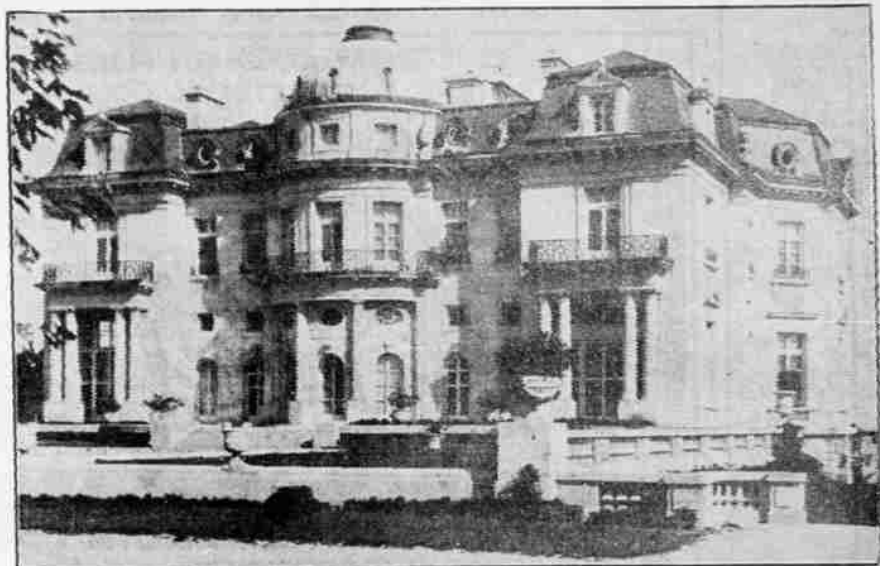

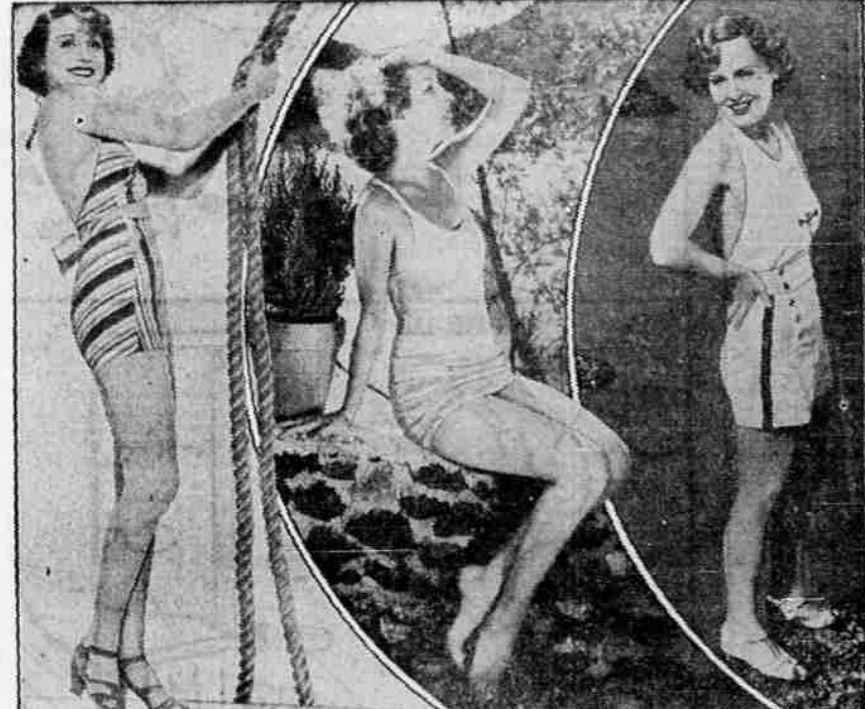

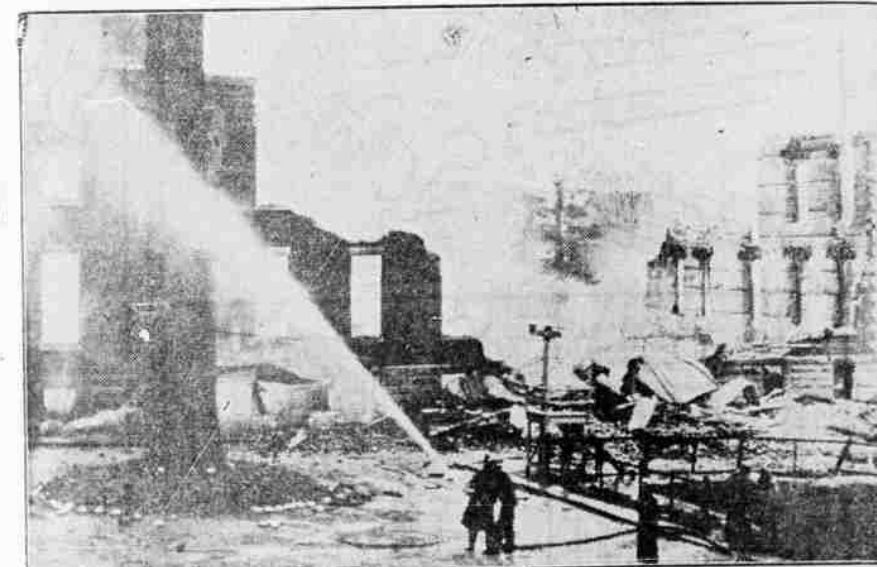
