BONUS PAYMENT MAIN LEGION AIM

ROCKLAND, Me. June 20.—(A)—The American Legion is not interested in inflation or deflation of the currency. National Commander Frank N. Belgrano said today, "but it is interested in seeing that the veterans' adjusted service certificates are paid."

Belgrano spoke before the annual convention of the Maine department of the legion, and after reviewing the history of the bonus fight, said: "If it is a stimulant that business needs, then it is the adjusted service certificates that will give it and it is up to the government to see to it that the veterans are paid."

"The legion is not interested in any political program. Politics are not included in this administration. But it has a right to go before congress on any legislation beneficial to the country."
