

SENTENCE OF SIX SLATED FRIDAY IN CRIMINAL ACTIONS

Sentences will be passed tomorrow morning upon six men, by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, the crimes ranging from statutory offenses involving girls of tender years, to sale of un-stamped meat.

The court will dispose of the motion for arrest of judgment, and a new trial in the case of Melvin Franklin Sallee, Yankee creek district SERRA worker, convicted by a circuit court jury, after 20 minutes, of an offense against a seven-year-old Central Point girl. Affidavits filed by the defense, charging errors by the court in two items of its instructions to the jury, attacking the validity of the identification of Sallee by Mrs. Violet Andrus of Central Point, and the methods assertedly employed by the district attorney, the state police, and the county jailer, will be met by counter-affidavits of the state.

One of the affidavits, charges that the mother of the girl, complaining witness, signalled her child, while she was on the witness stand, another that a dictaphone was used in the county jail. Affidavits denying both charges will be filed.

Sallee, through counsel, offered an alibi purporting to show he was on his way in his Yankee Creek home, during the hour of the crime.

Basil Petroff, 45, of Ashland, who entered a plea of guilty, to a statutory offense involving a six-year-old girl, and afterwards renounced his signed statement admitting the crime, will also be sentenced.

Other cases to be disposed of are: Floyd Sheppard, 18, Roseburg youth, and George A. Roberts, 20, transient, who entered pleas of guilty to auto theft. Sheppard is an escapee from the state training school at Woodburn.

Henry M. Everhard, under a suspended sentence for securing money under false pretenses, who has entered a plea of guilty to the sale of livestock belonging to another.

Joe Woodcock, Gold Hill and Bogus River district butcher, found guilty with a recommendation of leniency, by a circuit court jury, of sale of un-stamped meat.

The sun is scheduled on Friday to rise at 4:35 and set at 7:49, and on Saturday to rise at 4:36 and set at 7:50. The weatherman said, however, that daylight will be a few seconds shorter on Friday.

Summer will officially begin at 12:38 a. m., Saturday, which is the hour set for the summer solstice on 120th meridian time.

Mrs. Fred Goddard, who has been visiting her sister in San Francisco returned home June 15.

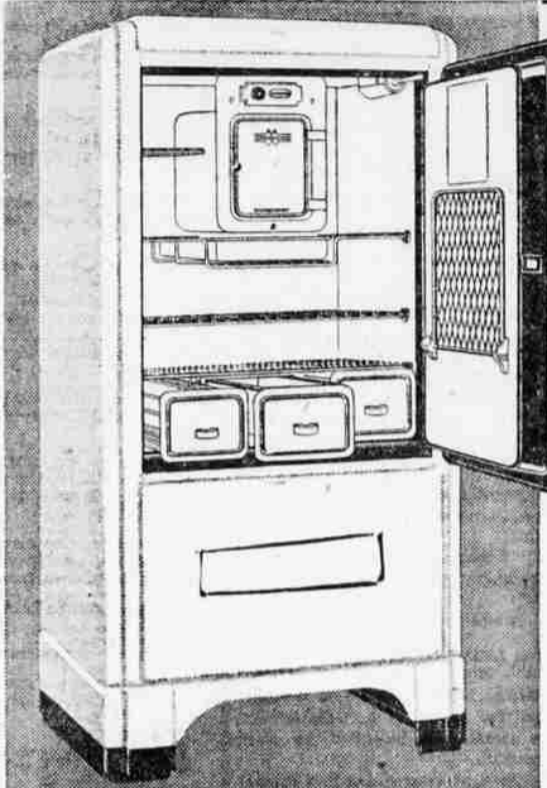
Mrs. Ira Bradley and daughter, Mrs. Henry Slagle, left for Albany, June
